

LOCAL MERCHANTS DISPLAY AT FAIR BEST EVER MADE

Tomorrow forenoon at 11 o'clock in the Merchants' building at the fair grounds, Paul Cragstone, manager western division, Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America, will talk to the business men of southern Oregon and northern California for 40 minutes.

Mr. Cragstone will speak on the importance of organization, both local, national and international. Invitations have been issued to the chambers in all the towns in this vicinity, including Ashland, Klamath Falls, Grants Pass and Yreka.

The Merchants building at the Jackson County Fair has received much favorable comment from the spectators during the first two days of the fair. The exhibitors engaged Tom Swen to plan and execute the general decoration scheme which is done in bright blue and a deep yellow bordering on orange. Purchasing material in large numbers and a part of the decorating plan and a vivid representation of Crater Lake completes the scheme, which is declared by the majority of spectators to be the best and most effective piece of decoration ever presented in a Jackson County Fair building.

A. Holmes, the insurance man with mechanical display of a revolving umbrella "covering everything"; Medford Domestic Laundry with a display showing the discomfort and inconvenience of old-fashioned hand washing; Modern Plumbing and Sheet Metal Works with a display of furnaces and a drinking fountain which supplies water to thirsty visitors; Southern Oregon Gas company displaying the Easy washer; Singer Sewing machines demonstrating; Thompson's Paint Store with a display of W. P. Fuller and company products; Virgin's Radio Service with a display of Zenith and Grebe radio sets; the Eden Valley Nursery displaying flowers and shrubs; the Big Pines Lumber company with a booth made of building materials from the concern and fitted with chairs for the comfort of visitors; Medford Book store, Dennison crepe paper and office equipment display and circulation offices of the Merchants' building of official paper, "The Book Store Blues"; Heath's Drug Store, Hudnut's perfumes and imported perfumes and toilet articles; Farm Bureau Co-operative Exchange, seeds, feeds and educational exhibit; Mann's Department store, women's wear; Brown Electric shop with a display showing the steps in the manufacture of threaded rubber insulation for Willard batteries; Brown and White, insurance and real estate; Klocker Printery, with an educational display concerning the history of printing; Medford Furniture and Hardware, displaying tools and furniture in separate booths; People's Electric, displaying Savage washers; Crater Lake Hardware with a display and educational exhibit of Maytag washers, and the California Oregon Power company with an educational display including motion pictures of Copco One and Copco Two; auto races at the Fair Grounds track, around and Crater Lakes and other interesting subjects.

A feature of the program in the Merchants' building are daily style shows. The show tonight will be put on by the Golden Rule. The Imperial orchestra furnishes music each afternoon and evening.

The style show last evening was given by the M. and M. Department store and a large assortment of women's wear was attractively displayed.
