

DAMAGE SUIT IS FILED FOR DEATH IN AUTO TRAGEDY

GRANTS PASS, Sept. 19.—(Special) Suit was started Friday against Audley Egger and Harold Todd for \$20,000 by Mrs. Sarah J. DeNike, grandmother of Miss Herma Hawes, who died as a result of injuries sustained in an automobile accident near Gold Hill on September 5. Costs were also wanted by the plaintiff.

In her complaint, Mrs. DeNike sets forth that Egger was driving the car, which belonged to Todd. She contends that they were traveling at excessive speed, setting forth 65 miles an hour as the rate. She also holds that the pavement was wet and slippery at the point where the accident occurred. She states that she is the only heir.

2 ASHLAND HUNTERS LOST, ARE FOUND

ASHLAND, Sept. 19.—After a search of two days and nights, Jack Edwards and Nate Simpkins were found in the vicinity of the Lake of the Woods, where they had been lost since Wednesday. Edwards and Simpkins started on a hunting trip Monday afternoon, expecting to return by Wednesday afternoon at the latest, since Simpkins, who is a railway mail clerk, expected to go out on his run Thursday. When the hunters did not return on time, a party of forest rangers started a search for them. All of Wednesday night and Thursday were spent. Friday morning the rangers called for help from Ashland to find them. W. M. Briggs, Roy Parr and Pat Dalley game wardens and Jim Beagle, all familiar with the Lake of the Woods country, left this morning to aid in the search. This evening it is reported the men were found in the vicinity of the Lake of the Woods. It is said that the snow obscured their losing their way.

DENY ANY TONNAGE AGREEMENT MADE

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Sept. 19.—Denial that there is a movement on foot for the Oregon Trunk and Southern Pacific to settle the present central Oregon rail battle through any tonnage agreement was made here by C. A. Hart of Portland, of general counsel for the Oregon Trunk. Mr. Hart is in Klamath Falls for the purpose of examining prospective witnesses who will appear before the interstate commerce commission in Portland next month.

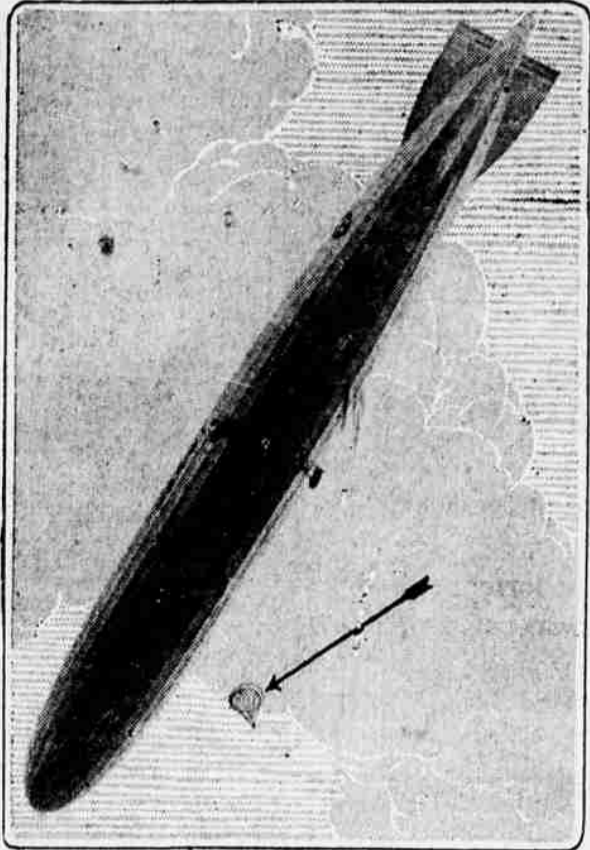
BOOTLEGGER BONDS BUSINESS HIT

FRENCH TROOPS ON OUEGHA, TRAVEL

FEZ, French Morocco, Sept. 19.—(A. P.)—An official communique today announced that the French forces operating north of the river Ouegha have reached Zaouia Oulad Ghezzar, eight miles northeast of the Bibane ridge and on the edge of the country of the Beni Brahlin tribe. Zaouia Oulad Ghezzar is ten miles due east of Anjot, capital of the strong Beni Zeroual tribe, which the French captured September 12. The Bibane position fell a few days later. Thus in the operations in the center of their front along the French troops, by reaching Zaouia Oulad Ghezzar have completed the occupation of a triangle marked by these three places comprising nearly 200 square miles in the last few days.

MACKMEN GAIN ON SENATORS, LEAD OF PIRATES UNCHANGED

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Most major league clubs were closely bunched today with the Pirates and Senators continuing their triumphant march toward the bunnings.

Four Boston pitchers fell under a barrage of eighteen hits from the Buccaneers who registered a 9 to 7 victory. However, Pittsburg's lead remained at seven games as the Giants topped the Cubs, 8 to 3.

The Cardinals strengthened their grip on the fourth round by turning out a 5 to 5 victory over Brooklyn. Dizzy Vance, Robin star twirler was replaced by Brown in the eighth inning when St. Louis scored seven runs. Vance's ineffectiveness was caused by a sore finger. The Cards are one game in front of Brooklyn.

Philadelphia trounced the Reds 5 to 1. Willoughby beating Donohue in a pitching duel.

The world champions easily disposed of the White Sox, 10 to 5, but a double victory for the Athletics over the Tigers, 4 to 2, and 7 to 3 enabled the Mackmen to gain half a game.

The Senators now lead by seven games. Detroit holds fourth place against Chicago by one game.

Cleveland made sixth place more secure against the Yankees by coming out on the long end of a six to five score in Boston. The Indians have a two game margin on the Hugmen.

Babe Ruth's 20th four bagger helped New York defeat the Browns, 4 to 1. McManus of St. Louis broke the Yankee's pitchers' record of 42 earned runless innings by slamming his nineteenth circuit drive of the year in the sixth.

TIMES CONFESSOR READY TO FACE M'NAMARA AGAIN

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 19.—(A. P.) Arto McManigal, whose confession fifteen years for a part in the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times in 1911, may face McNamara in the trial of the labor leader here for blackmail. It is known McManigal is registered at an Indianapolis hotel under an assumed name, the prosecution fearing he might be in danger of his life should his identity become known.

The defense introduced four witnesses, all ironworkers, in the half day session of criminal court today. All testified they did not hear McNamara threaten workmen of other crafts employed on the Elks club during the day the state alleges the labor chief intimidated an employe of a truck concern.

They further testified a boiler, which was being unloaded into a cellar did not topple off a runway and dislodge a pillar of the building. Witnesses for the prosecution declared McNamara knocked a stanchion from under a boiler causing it to fall against an important pillar throwing it out of position, at the same time remarking the whole building "should be torn down."

The defense expects to complete its case Monday.
