## PIRATE OUTFIELDER EQUALS RECORD OF 10 STRAIGHT HITS

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—Pittsburg's pennant march in the National league race continues unimpeded. Bolstered by seven consecutive victories the Pirates need to win but three more of their remaining nine games to nail the flag to their mast. Washington needs five of its scheduled twelve games to triumph in the American league.

The Corsairs pounded out a 9 to 7 victory over the Phillies yesterday. Hazen Cuyler, Pittsburg outfielder, hit safely in his first two times at bat, running his string of straight hits to ten. This is believed to equal the National record made by Ed Konetchy of Brooklyn in 1919. This Speaker of the Indians holds the major league record, however, with safe hits in seven consecutive times at bat in 1920.

The Robins have been losing us consistently as the Pirates have been winning. Brooklyn dropped its eighth straight to the Cubs 3 to 2 which places the Robins practically out of reach of the first division this season. Bob McGraw, pitcher purchased from Minneapolis for \$25,000, has joined Robbin's club.

Five pitchers failed to stay the Braves and the Reds lost 7 to 6. Walker of Cincinnati hit a homer with one on base in the first inning. Rain washed away the Giants-Cards game in St. Louis.

The Athletics turned out a ten to seven victory in their last meeting with the Bombers this year. The Mack men have won fourteen of twenty-two games with the Tigers in their series. Washington and the other American league clubs were not scheduled. Miller Huggins, manager of the Yankees, favors the world champions to beat the Pirates in the world series. He believes the Senators' pitching staff and veteran players give them the edge.

Victory for Pittsburg is predicted by John A. Heydler, National league president. Pittsburg will put into the series probably the best team ever entered by the league, he said at Louisville.

## SPORT BRIEFS

SAN FRANCISCO—George A. Putnam, president of the San Francisco baseball club, announced the team will meet the Louisville club, champions of the "world's series," if the Reds win the Coast league flag.

LOS ANGELES—Fay Thomas, captain of the University of Southern California football team, was declared ineligible for further athletic competition on the ground that he had accepted money for playing baseball.

COLORADO SPRINGS.—Three Colorado horses, Major Henry Leonard's Norfleet, Edward Pring's Ranger and Mark Hirsch's Sandy made the best time for the first day of the Colorado endurance ride which started this morning. Each finished the sixty mile grind in a few minutes less than nine hours.

SEATTLE, Sept. 22.—Louis Tesreau of Chehalis, Wash., who was the backbone of the last University of Washington freshman football team, a brother of Elmer Tesreau, captain of the Husky varsity eleven, was pronounced fit for hard work again today.

Tesreau injured his left leg in practice Friday and it was feared it might keep him out of games this year.

## WALKER IS GIVEN DECISION IN HARD BATTLE WITH SHADE

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—(A. P.)—Mickey Walker of Elizabeth, N. J., and his two battering fists still rule the welterweight division of the pugilistic world.

In a furious rally in the final round of a grueling fifteen round struggle with his leading challenger, Dave Shade of San Francisco, the champion demonstrated to the satisfaction of two out of three officials last night that he still is entitled to wield the scepter in the 147 pound class.

George T. Kelly of Yonkers, N. Y., one of the judges, thought Shade won. Richard Nugent of Buffalo, the other judge, voted for Walker. Then referee Patsy Haley decided the issue by returning a verdict for the champion.

With but a few exceptions most of the newspaper critics conceded Walker a clean-cut victory; he finished the stronger after having forced the fighting over almost the entire route in addition to dealing out the heavier blows.

Shade, one of the most elusive marks in the ring, for the most part cast aside the dodging, weaving defense by which he had often baffled opponents in other fights. He traded punches toe to toe with the champion. It was a game at which Walker was highly proficient and the change in tactics spelled defeat for the crafty Californian.

Tonight at the University club, Suganuma will play an exhibition game with Maru, who swears in English and Japanese that he will get more points than Fujii.
