C. PALM TO BUILD \$2500 BUILDING

Hon. J. H. Carkin To Address Body On Normal Plans

Linn W. NeSmith, chairman of the Klamath county chamber of commerce forum committee announced that the speaker of the day for the forum luncheon Wednesday will be Hon. John H. Carkin of Medford, who will speak on the Southern Oregon Normal School, which is located at Ashland.

Mr. Carkin is a member of the lower house of the Oregon legislature, as a representative from Jackson county and he is largely responsible for the \$200,000 appropriation during the last session of the legislature to re-establish the southern Oregon normal school at Ashland.

Representative Carkin is one of the most prominent lawyers of the southern part of the state, is city attorney of Medford and has represented his county in the legislature for two sessions. He was floor leader for Speaker Denton G. Burdick during the last session and was chairman of the committee on judiciary and a member of the committee on legislation, resolutions, rules and joint rules, vetoed bills, per diem and mileage, which are the most important committees in the legislature.

Close friends of Mr. Carkin throughout the state are urging him to be a candidate for speaker of the house

during the next session which convenes in Salem in January, 1927. Mr. Carkin is most familiar with the state of Oregon, and the problems of the southern part of the state in particular, and his address will be both interesting and instructive.

Mrs. Carkin will accompany her husband.—Klamath Falls News.
