BEST VAUDEVILLE IN WEEKS, CRATERIAN

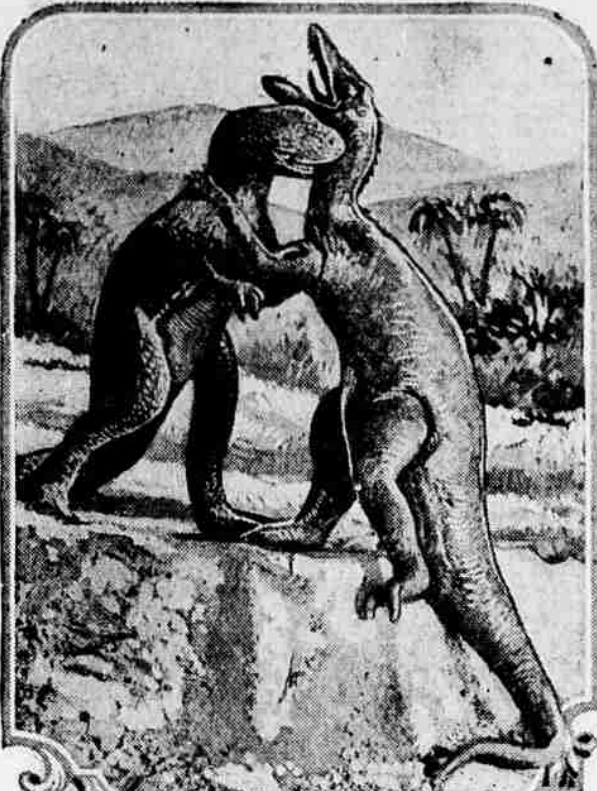

"Lost World," Wonderful Film



Prehistoric Monsters Battling. A Scene From 'The Lost World'

Great interest is being shown in "The Lost World," which opened at Hunt's Craterian today, as it gives interesting data regarding the prehistoric monsters.

The carnivorous beast that wars on its fellows is a tyrannosaurus, one of the dinosaur family, and weighs, when fully grown, 75,000 pounds. It could look over a four story building, walk on the hind feet and has short fore-paws for tearing its victims.

First of these prehistoric monsters in the picture is the Pterodactyle, a

creature that flies, the spread of its wings equalling the spread of a scout warplane. It was the scavenger of the Jurassic period. The brontosaurus, known as the "thunder" reptile, taken away captive by the explorers, that demolishes London bridge and escapes to the sea in the picture, is believed to have weighed 150,000 pounds. It was herbivorous and lived in marshes. The armored animal is a stegosaurus, its plates three feet high, and it had horns in its tail with which it disemboweled its enemies.

21 WITNESSES WILL TESTIFY FOR STATE IN PRISON KILLING

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 24.—Subpoenas have been issued for 21 persons to appear as witnesses for the state in the trial of Tom Murray, Ellsworth Kelley and James Wilcox, who escaped from the state penitentiary August 12 after killing J. M. Holman and John Sweeney, two guards. The trials begin with the Murray hearing on October 5. All three of the convicts are accused of first degree murder.

The persons whom the state will call as witnesses are:

Lloyd T. Rigdon, county coroner; George Weigel, a photographer; Dr. W. Carlton Smith; Dr. G. E. Prime; J. S. Murray, chief clerk at the prison; Robert Crawford, flax superintendent at the prison; A. M. Dalrymple, warden; Peter J. White, guard; J. B. Nesmith, turkey who was knocked out with a cuspidor by the escaping convicts; John Davison, guard who killed Oregon Jones during the break; Charles McKinley, W. E. Gardner and S. B. Sandifer, guards; Lute Savage, guard who was wounded by the fugitives; Zina J. Zinn, taxicab driver, who was kidnaped and whose car was commandeered by the escapes; Leo P. Wilde, Otto Lucht and N. W. Miller, three Monitor youths who were kidnaped by the fugitives and who took them to the Newman home near New Era; George Holston, Alice W. Osborn and W. H. McElroy.
