It resulted from brush being burned without a proper permit. The humidity, according to the local office, is still low, making it dangerous to build camp fires without proper caution.

The lots may be procured on a special use permit of \$10 each year, the permit being revocable at any time, or a ten year permit may be secured for \$15 per year.
