**Film Depicts Life  
Of Strange Monsters**

If you are in search of new experiences: if you want a new thrill; if you think the movies have exhausted their possibilities, go to the Hunt's Craterian and see "The Lost World," made from one of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's queer books. It's that sort of a picture. You'll be entertained, fascinated, shocked into thinking a bit. It has been possible to put the wild imaginings of Doyle into concrete form and bring them visually, moving and seeming to live.

It is about a small party of Londoners who go on an exploring expedition into the wildest part of South America, and there, on an almost inaccessible plateau, find the monstrous creatures in life that the present civilization knows only as fossil remains.

There are flesh eating dinosaurs, and the more gentle brontosaurus, alligators and pterodactyls, dreadful looking beasts as science has recreated them for us in drawings, made from the skeletons which have been dug up from rocks where they have been entombed for millions of years.

Doyle and the screen permit us to look on the monster more as they lived, devastating monsters, terrible in their size alone; frightful when they are in combat with one another, for there are battles between the dinosaurs themselves.

But while these gigantic and fantastic creatures are the chief aim of the picture, there is built up a human story that holds interest without them.

After that, many things happen, but in the end Dan wins Marjorie.

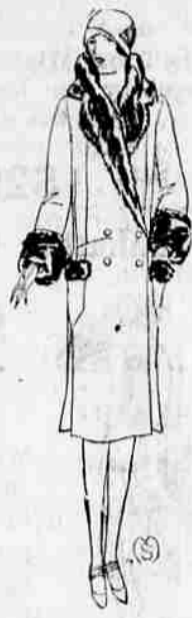
There is a great deal to be said for Pal's actions. He not only does things intelligently, but he shows his emotions by his facial expression.
