O. A. C. EXPERT TO MAKE REPORT ON WATER SITUATION

At the request of a number of members of the Medford Chamber of Commerce for information regarding the proposed new water supply for the city of Medford, President R. W. Clancy felt the chamber could best serve its members by getting a state engineer to go over the project and make a report. Accordingly the following letter was addressed to the president of the Oregon Agricultural college:

Sept. 19, 1925. Mr. W. J. Kerr, President Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oregon.

My Dear Mr. Kerr: The city of Medford is confronted with the situation which has to do with our water supply. The Medford chamber of commerce has been called upon for recommendation in the matter. We are thoroughly aware that it is necessary for us to inform our members intelligently and to have the matter analyzed by no other than an expert.

With the above thought in our minds we come to you this morning with a request that you designate a reputable engineer at our expense to investigate and make a recommendation to the Medford Chamber of Commerce as he might find the situation. We will lend you for the use of your delegate, all the assistance that he might demand, covering of course such matters of transportation, records that are now on hand or may be compiled, and any and all assistance that he may find convenient for his use. As the time to secure this information is very short and our people urging us for a recommendation, we would like to have you dispatch this engineer to us as quickly as possible, and would be pleased to hear from you by wire at our expense, the exact date and time we can expect him.

CRATER L. SEASON CLOSED ABRUPTLY BY SNOW STORM

A heavy snow storm resulted in the official Crater lake season ending unexpectedly yesterday afternoon instead of this morning, as previously planned. The snow, which started to fall lightly in the morning, grew heavier as the storm progressed until yesterday afternoon the storm had reached blizzard proportions and there was six or seven inches of snow on the ground.

Hence the lodge officers, fearing they and their employees might be snowed in, hastily did the finishing touches of packing and all departed in the five stages for Medford, reaching here about 10 o'clock last night. The party of 18 officials and employees of the lodge departed in the five stages at 7:30 this morning from the Hotel Medford for their homes in Portland and other points north from here.
