## PIRATES APPEAR TO HAVE EDGE IN THE OUTFIELD

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—Two mighty outfields, strong in every department of baseball, will clash when Washington and Pittsburg meet in the first game of the world's series next Wednesday.

A contest for slugging honors impends between the two heaviest hitters of the rival squads, Leon (Goose) Goslin, Washington's home run hero of the 1924 series, and Hazen Cuyler, young Pirate outfielder.

The Goose hit 344 last fall and was always dangerous. He has been a bit erratic this year, trailing his outfield mate, Sam Rice, in the league percentage column, but Goslin has the familiar Washington habit of being at his best in the pinch.

Cuyler combines with Max Carey and Clyde Barnhart to form an outer array which seems superior to the Washington trio of Goslin, Rice and Earl McNeely, or Joe Harris, if the comparison of season averages is taken as conclusive.

The Pirates, for instance, have an edge on speed. Carey has 42 base steals to his credit against 27 for Cuyler. Barnhart has pilfered nine, to give Pittsburg a total of 88. Washington's outfielders have stolen 64, with Goslin and Rice sharing first honors with 27 apiece.

Cuyler is the leading run getter and according to the averages is the best hitter on either club, his 350 this season placing him among the first five batsmen in the National league.

Carey has batted .340 for the season and Barnhart .327, an outfield average of .342. Rice's mark is .350, Goslin's .340, McNeely's .288 and Joe Harris' .305.

With McNeely playing center field the Senator outer works averages .325, but with Harris in the lineup the figures are .352.

Pittsburg's outfield, therefore, is 10 batting percentage points better than Washington's—on paper.

## NEW OREGON COACH OFFERS NO ALIBIS

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 1.—With but two days remaining before the opening clash of the season the University of Oregon football team is fast rounding into shape. A few days ago the work was ragged but the football drill has been intensive and a smoother-working machine is now on the field.

The first game is to be with the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club of Portland on the local field. Last year the club men defeated Oregon, 6 to 0, and this year they are touted as stronger than ever. Oregon is anticipating a real battle.

"I haven't any bear stories to give out," says Coach Dick Smith. "We have the best prospects in years and if we lose it's our own fault, or because some other team had the best of us. That's all there is to it."

## SECOND DIVISION TEAMS FIGHTING FOR FINAL HONORS

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—(A. P.)

Three games separated the four second division clubs in the National league today giving the Phillies, the present tail ender, the mathematical possibility of climbing into sixth place by the close of the season on Sunday.

Philadelphia's second straight triumph over the Robins yesterday, 6 to 4, kept Brooklyn from unseating the Braves from the fifth rung. The Robins have won but two of their last seventeen contests.

All of the second division teams, with the exception of the Braves, have three more games to play. Boston has but two contests, with Brooklyn on Saturday and Sunday.

Should Fletcher's club win all of its remaining games, Chicago has two and the Robins three, the Phillies will come from the cellar into the sixth position.

Brooklyn and Chicago are in a position to take fifth place from the Braves, mathematically.

But one American league game was played yesterday, the Red Sox winning from a makeshift club of the Senators, 5 to 4. The end of the contest found but one Washington regular in the lineup.

The world champions continue with their series at Boston, where the Indians will cross bats with the White Sox and the Tigers battle with the Browns in their last series of the year.

## CALLISON PUTS GINGER IN HIGH SCHOOL WARRIORS

Coach Frank Callison started in Wednesday afternoon to eliminate the nonchalant from his squad, and lectures were the order of the practice.

The first team were raked over the oratorical coals, when the second squad made yardage consistently through their best defense. Scrimmages will be held until Friday night, and the boys who show up the best in practice will play in the game Saturday with Klamath Falls.

Prospects for the local line-up are as follows:

Melroe, center; Neff and Putney, or one of three others guards; Hubbard and Morgan tackles; Singler, Green and Kelly, ends; Williams, Herriot, or Dunn, quarter; Senn or Archer, fullback; Moores, Shortly Moores, Cooks, Williams and Conrad, halfbacks.

In the event there is no fence around the grounds Saturday, special ushers will wander through the crowd and see that all spectators have tickets. Special policemen have been secured to see there is no argument over the purchase of tickets. The game will be played on the new athletic field, and will start at 2:30 o'clock.

The Klamath Falls team for the first time in years, is rated as a contender for the southern Oregon championship and defeated Grants Pass last Saturday seven to nothing.

COVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 1.—Fans at the Willamette-Oregon Agricultural college football game here Saturday will see Coach Schliesser use two distinct back fields which he will probably change in a group, rather than as individuals. Edwards, quarter; Schulmerich and Bell, halves; with Sulder at full make up a heavy, plugging combination capable of crashing most any line for gains, observers here say.

Lauster, quarter; Quinn and Luby, halves, with Dennison, full, is the other combination, built for speed, open field running and passing.

First scrimmage between varsity and rooks was held last night. Coach Schliesser's first string was kept in a comparatively short time, but garnered three touchdowns. The second and third squads each gathered two. Most were won by the aerial route.

Coach Schliesser expressed himself as well pleased with the showing of the men as a whole and also as impressed with the quality of material among the rooks.

## ABANDON HOPE OF FINDING RANCHER

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Oct. 1.—All hope of finding Martin Owensby alive has been abandoned by posse through Huckleberry mountain.

Owensby, a Merrill, Oregon, farmer, dropped from sight three weeks ago yesterday while in that densely wooded country although his horse and rifle were found a few days later. Heavy snow in that district made further search impossible.
