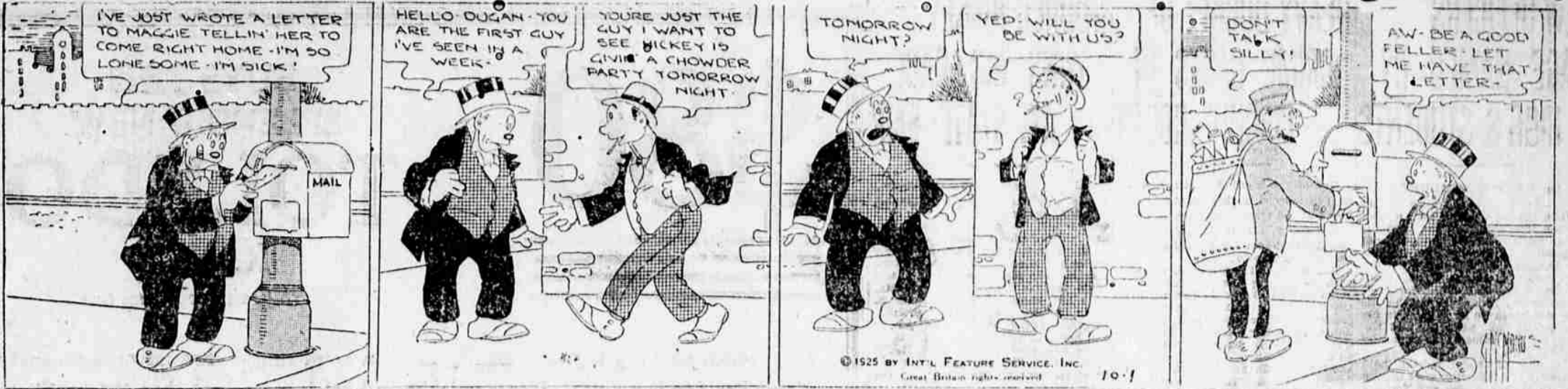


BRINGING UP FATHER

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Music in Jackson County Schools

It is evident that school boards of the county are more awake to the need of music in our schools than they have ever been before. Medford and Ashland have a music supervisor, and last year Butte Falls secured a teacher for music. For several years Phoenix and Gold Hill have had efficient music work through carrying it on somewhat departmentally. But this year the following schools in addition are making effort to have definite instruction in rote music in at least a part of their grades: Central Point, Talent, Jacksonville and Eagle Point.

9. Know yourself the life history of the great composers and the story of their compositions so that you can tell your children. There are a number of helpful books published. Place them in your library. 10. Own a good radio and bring into your home the greatest and best that radio offers. Purchase for your library those musical selections which you have heard over the radio. Do you realize that America is today the center of the greatest musical renaissance that the world has ever known?

In several rural schools excellent beginning was made last year, notably in Willow Springs, Reese Creek, Wimer and Oak Grove schools. More teachers are this year ready to attempt regular work in music, because they prepared for it during summer school.

In the line of music appreciation almost every school named above has carried on excellent work chiefly through definite presentation with the Victrola. A number of schools have purchased Victrolas and so are again ready to follow on in this line. The county superintendent's office is again ready to send out lists of records which this year lead into some new possibilities in music study. Miss Leona Marsters of Eugene schools is editing a department of music in The Oregon Teachers Monthly published in Salem and the outlines presented are attracting attention of our teachers. Miss Marsters will present work in music during the Medford Institute.

The following excellent program for music in the home as worked out by the general federation chairman of music, Mrs. Mark Oberndorfer, is offered by the division of the home making department of the American Home. It is given to the press with the hope that the homes of Jackson county may more than support the efforts of the schools in all lines of music.

Ten Rules for Music in the Home 1. Make the musical instruments in your home a part of the home circle for the enjoyment and education of your family. Do not regard these instruments as furniture only.

2. Surround your children with music of the same character that you feel is right for them to have in pictures and books. 3. Own a player piano or a phonograph. These self playing instruments, if rightly used, will do more to stimulate an interest in good music and to cultivate musical taste, than any other medium.

4. Begin the definite study of music when your child has learned to love good musical selections. Choose the best teacher, not the cheapest. 5. See that the practice hours are made interesting rather than tedious. Change your question from "How many minutes did you practice today?" to "Have you learned your music lesson?"

6. Let your children realize that the study of music is of equal importance with the other studies of school. Bring into the home circle the musical selections which can be correlated with the study of geography and history.

7. Arrange the practice period so that father may not be disturbed. Encourage the children to play for father at least once a week. 8. Arrange a music hour in your home a number of times a week, when all can sing together the best old songs and can hear the best known and level instrumental selections. Have a Sunday hour when you can sing good hymns. A home memory contest can be planned for each month.

Red Top School House Builders Win Suit

In the injunction suit of J. M. Kershaw and other tax payers and patrons of School District No. 10 (Red Top Schoolhouse, east of Medford) against the school board and Lockwood and Meehan, contractors, to prevent the payment of approximately \$4000 due on construction, on account of alleged faulty construction of the building, the circuit court Wednesday handed down a decision favoring the defendants. The plaintiffs alleged that the schoolhouse had not been built properly, and for this reason attempted to hold up the payment of the balance due.
