### AUTO OWNER WINS INSURANCE CASE

A judgment in favor of E. G. Steiger against the Union Allied Underwriters of the Union Insurance Society of Canton, China, was handed down Thursday by Circuit Judge C. M. Thomas. Steiger sued for \$300 and was awarded that amount, the defendant not appearing.

Steiger charged in his complaint that he and the W. S. Maxwell Co., of Portland, Oregon, took out insurance for \$300 on a Chevrolet car on February 8, 1924 the car was destroyed in a garage fire at Grants Pass. Though he demanded payment and asked for proof blanks to agree to his loss, both were denied by the insurance company. Steiger charged that the Maxwell company claim of \$240 was paid without protest, but his own claim for the balance ignored.

### PLANT YELLOW PINE IN CRATER L. FOREST

Approximately 60 acres of mountain country in the Crater National forest will be replanted with 4-year-old yellow pine trees in the very near future. The first consignment of trees will arrive next Monday from

the government nursery at Wind River, Wn.  
Ten of the 60 acres will be planted by W. J. Sprout near Prospect in the Bonaha district, burned over by a 1909 acre fire last summer. Lee P. Brown will supervise the planting of the remaining 50 acres in the Mosquito country near Mount McLoughlin. The trees, which are but a foot high, will be planted in squares six feet apart and deep enough to give the roots a good anchorage. Brown's planting crew will include approximately 10 men who will commence work next Monday. Sprout will have less. Two months, it is expected, will be needed to complete the work.

### 3 ASHLAND BOYS SENT TO HOME

Virgil, 13, Cyril, seven, and Ellis Lacy, 11, brothers, were ordered committed to the Beaverton home for Boys at Beaverton, Oregon, Thursday by County Judge Hartzell sitting as juvenile judge.
