

COUNTY BAR ADVOCATES CHANGE COUNTY SEAT

Every progressive citizen of Jackson county has long realized that the proper location for the county seat of the county is at Medford, the business center of the county.

The time for removal has now arrived. The present county court house is entirely inadequate for the needs of the county.

When the people vote to change a county seat the law requires the change to be made within one year. No bonds can be issued for court house purposes by the county.

It is only fair that Medford in this crisis should do something substantial to meet this situation because the location of the county seat here will result in practical advantages too obvious to require enumeration to every business institution in the city.

It is therefore proposed that Medford issue \$50,000 in bonds for the purpose of erecting a building which can be used temporarily for county court house purposes and later can be converted into a new city hall, which the city will soon urgently require.

The net cost to Medford in the end will be negligible because the present quarters occupied by the city hall are becoming more and more valuable as business property and can later be sold for sufficient to pay the bulk of the bonds proposed to be issued.

THIRD PERMIT.

For balance of Big Butte water, pursuant to 1925 law priority of May 28, 1925.

This is to certify that I have examined the foregoing application and do hereby grant the same, subject to the following limitations and conditions:

Subject to existing rights the city of Medford is hereby granted the exclusive right to the use of the waters of Big Butte creek and of the springs at the head of and which form said stream, and of the tributaries of said stream, for municipal purposes, as provided in chapter 166, laws of Oregon for 1925.

The amount of water appropriated shall be limited to the amount which can be applied to beneficial use and not to exceed (see above) cubic feet per second, or its equivalent in case of rotation. The priority date of this permit is May 28, 1925, the date upon which the law providing for this appropriation became effective.

Actual construction work shall begin on or before September 18, 1929, and shall thereafter be prosecuted with reasonable diligence and be completed on or before September 18, 1930.

Complete application of the water to the proposed use shall be made on or before October 1, 1931.

MEDFORD PERMITS ESTABLISH RIGHTS BIG BUTTE SPRINGS

The following copies of State Engineer Luper's permits, certified to by City Recorder Alford, absolutely establish Medford's rights to Big Butte waters:

FIRST PERMIT.

Thirty second feet equal priority with Eagle Point Irrigation District, priority of August 21, 1915.

State of Oregon, County of Marion, ss.

This is to certify that I have examined the foregoing application and do hereby grant the same, subject to the following limitations and conditions:

If for irrigation, this appropriation shall be limited to one-eighth of an acre cubic feet per second, or its equivalent, for each acre irrigated, and shall be subject to such reasonable rotation system as may be ordered by the proper state officer.

The right herein granted is limited to the appropriation of water from Big Butte creek, its tributaries, and the springs contributing to it and those forming it, for municipal purposes, including irrigation, domestic, sewer, fire protection, and all other municipal purposes, in accordance with the state engineer's order and allotment dated April 25, and recorded on pages 178-179 of Volume one, special order record.

The amount of water appropriated shall be limited to the amount which can be applied to beneficial use and not to exceed 30.0 cubic feet per second, or its equivalent in case of rotation. The priority date of this permit is August 21, 1915.

Actual construction work shall begin on or before April 25, 1930 and shall thereafter be prosecuted with reasonable diligence and be completed on or before April 25, 1930.

Complete application of the water to the proposed use shall be made on or before October 1, 1931.

SECOND PERMIT.

Thirty second feet subsequent to Eagle Point Irrigation District, priority of October 20, 1923.

State of Oregon, County of Marion, ss.

This is to certify that I have examined the foregoing application and do hereby grant the same, subject to the following limitations and conditions:

If for irrigation, this appropriation shall be limited to one-eighth of an acre cubic feet per second, or its equivalent, for each acre irrigated, and shall be subject to such reasonable rotation system as may be ordered by the proper state officer.

The right herein granted is limited to the appropriation of water from Big Butte Springs at the head of Big Butte creek, for municipal water supply, including irrigation, fire protection and all other municipal uses.

The amount of water appropriated shall be limited to the amount which can be applied to beneficial use and not to exceed 30.0 cubic feet per second, or its equivalent in case of rotation. The priority date of this permit is October 20, 1923.

Actual construction work shall begin on or before April 25, 1930 and shall thereafter be prosecuted with reasonable diligence and be completed on or before April 25, 1930.

Complete application of the water to the proposed use shall be made on or before October 1, 1931.

THIRD PERMIT.

For balance of Big Butte water, pursuant to 1925 law priority of May 28, 1925.

This is to certify that I have examined the foregoing application and do hereby grant the same, subject to the following limitations and conditions:

Subject to existing rights the city of Medford is hereby granted the exclusive right to the use of the waters of Big Butte creek and of the springs at the head of and which form said stream, and of the tributaries of said stream, for municipal purposes, as provided in chapter 166, laws of Oregon for 1925.

The amount of water appropriated shall be limited to the amount which can be applied to beneficial use and not to exceed (see above) cubic feet per second, or its equivalent in case of rotation. The priority date of this permit is May 28, 1925, the date upon which the law providing for this appropriation became effective.

Actual construction work shall begin on or before September 18, 1929, and shall thereafter be prosecuted with reasonable diligence and be completed on or before September 18, 1930.

Complete application of the water to the proposed use shall be made on or before October 1, 1931.

ASHLAND PASTOR ELECTED LEADER SOUTHERN OREGON

ASHLAND PARTY LEAVES TO CONFER WITH MR. SUNDAY

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 5.—With a plea of Bishop W. O. Shephard and all district superintendents to increase the membership of the Methodist church in this state ten per cent during the coming year, the seventy-third annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal church of the state came to a close here last night.

Ministers and appointees for the southern, eastern, Salem and Portland districts were announced last night. S. A. Danford, who has been superintendent of the southern district which includes Eugene, was transferred to the position of area evangelist and supervisor of new work. All other superintendents remained in office.

Rev. S. J. Chaney of Ashland, will be the superintendent of the southern district. The boundaries of the southern and eastern districts were changed so that several charges were put into the eastern district from the southern district. These include Klamath Falls, Lakeview, Pine Creek, Beatty, Klamath Indian mission and Chiloquin.

The meeting held yesterday afternoon for the purpose of ordaining six deacons and five elders, turned into an evangelistic rally, and the entire conference pledged by standing vote to increase the membership in the church by 2700, ten per cent of the present total.

Rev. D. H. Lesech, formerly pastor here and now superintendent of the Salem district, brought the audience to its feet by a stirring evangelistic plea, during which he personally pledged to convert one person in every one of his charges.

The note of evangelism struck in the conference led to a motion to send a telegram of encouragement to Billy Sunday, who is now conducting a series of evangelistic meetings in Portland. The resolution was adopted on motion of W. W. Youngson, pastor of the First City church, Portland.
