

HUNTLEY PLEADS NOT GUILTY TO MURDER CHARGE

Hyman Huntley, middle-aged section hand, indicted last week by the grand jury on a charge of first-degree murder, as an outgrowth of a stabbing affray in this city September 20, wherein Jesse James Gibbs, homesteader and mill worker, died, was arraigned before Circuit Judge C. M. Thomas Monday morning and entered a plea of not guilty. The attention Gibbs is alleged to have paid the wife of the grey-haired prisoner was the motive for the tragedy.

It is expected that Huntley will plead self-defense. He was represented in court by Attorney George M. Roberts. It is the first case in Jackson county in ten years in which the extreme penalty is death.

C. A. Ramsey, indicted on a charge of larceny by bailment, was given until Wednesday morning to plead.

J. S. Wheaton, indicted for larceny of household goods from the J. M. Rigdon home at Ashland, will enter a plea at the same time.

It is probable that the trials of the three men will be placed on the calendar for the term of court starting October 25.

CHOOSE CATHOLIC AS CHAPLAIN FOR OREGON CONVICTS

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 6.—Rev. T. V. Keenan, pastor of the new St. Vincent De Paul parish in north Salem, was today elected by the state board of control as Catholic chaplain for the boys' training school and the state penitentiary, succeeding Rev. J. H. Buck, pastor of St. Joseph's church of Salem, who resigned today. For some years Father Keenan has been assistant at St. Paul's church.

Father Keenan at once entered a protest with the board against the manner of conducting religious services at the boys' school whereby the Catholic and Protestant chaplains conduct alternate general Sunday services at the school without segregation of Catholic and Protestant boys. His objection was that the method gave no opportunity for instructing Catholic boys in the Catholic faith.

An agreement was reached whereby the general services will be conducted as in the past, but additional time given the Catholic chaplain following his general service in which to instruct the Catholic boys at the school. The board today further threshed out the petition of labor union representatives for a readjustment of engineers' wages at the state institutions. It is probable that the board will give the superintendents authority to adjust individual cases, but not order a general revision of wages. In the meantime they are instructed to ascertain the scale of wages paid at the institutions of other states.

NEW CITY HALL COST \$1 A YEAR AVERAGE TAXPAYER

The average taxpayer in Medford who goes to Jacksonville once a year, and most of them go twice, paying half tax every six months, pays more in actual cash, not counting the time required or the wear and tear on his car, than he would pay each year on the principle and interest of the proposed bond issue of \$50,000 for the new city hall to be used as a temporary courthouse.

With the present assessed valuation of \$5,000,000 in Medford, a one mill levy would raise \$50,000 a year and in ten years would pay the \$500,000, principle and interest, taking into consideration the increased valuation and the reduction of the total bond issue each year as payments are made.

County Assessor Coleman says \$1000 is above the average levy for residences in Medford and on this basis it would cost about \$1 per year to the average taxpayer to help pay the bonds.

This does not take into consideration the sale of the present city hall, which would bring more than half the amount of the bond issue, that would be applied to cancel bonds and would reduce the levy one-half, or the time for paying the bonds to five years instead of ten.
