Boylen was out in the nearby hills recently looking after some sheep. He was seated in his car with his left elbow on the car door and his left hand on the steering wheel while lightning was playing around in the nearby trees. One bolt struck a tree close by and part of the bolt ran up Boylen's arm in a thin blue flame. The bolt went on down through the steering gear. Boylen was partially stunned but apparently suffered no ill after effects save for a sore arm.

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COOLIDGE FIRST PRESIDENT TO VISIT LEGION

OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 7.—(A. P.)—President Coolidge coming into a World War atmosphere was in Omaha yesterday to address the American Legion convention and review the annual parade of legionnaires. Arriving here at 8:30 a. m. after a 1300-mile journey from Washington, the president found the city swarming with former service men and the weather as disagreeable as it frequently was in France.

A cold driving rain reckoned to put a damper on the day's activities as the sky was so overcast that there was slight prospect of a let-up in the downpour.

The president and Mrs. Coolidge were greeted at Union station by James A. Drain, national commander of the American Legion, whose wife had come from Washington on the presidential train. Governor McMullen of Nebraska, Mayor Ehlman of Omaha and a score of prominent citizens and legion officials, hundreds of former service men jammed the train shed and station, and as the president passed they broke into cheers.

From the station Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge were taken to the home of Walter Head, Omaha banker, who at one time was president of the American Bankers' association. Although they had been aboard the train nearly forty hours, neither appeared fatigued. They smiled acknowledgements to cheers, their enthusiasm of being in the midst of a patriotic demonstration apparently unimpaired by the nasty weather.

FIND SKELETON PREHISTORIC MAN IN HIGHWAY WORK

RENO, Nev., Oct. 7.—(A. P.)—A box of petrified bones brought to the governor's office at Carson City yesterday by George Kress, photographer for the highway department, indicates the discovery of a skeleton of a prehistoric man of gigantic size. A nearly complete innominate bone, the ball joint of a femur together with about a foot of the shank and stub of a canine tooth, 4 1/2 inches long were in the box. Kress said he also found vertebrae measuring ten inches long.

The pelvic bone is something over a foot wide and seven or eight inches thick. The spongy process is clearly apparent, but the entire mass is turned to stone. The leg joint is 5 1/2 inches in diameter and the shank is three inches thick. The canine tooth is shaped to indicate the original length as six inches to the point which is broken off.

The innominate bone in man combines several bones of the lower animals completing the pelvic arch and the fact that this specimen is single indicates human origin.

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
