

PLAN TO SPEND \$10,000 ON HOT SPRINGS GROUNDS

ASHLAND, Oct. 7.—Jackson's Hot Springs will have an overhauling at the hands of the new owners, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Milton. The new owners plan to spend \$10,000 in remodeling the place and will make it a popular health and recreation resort. Cottages will be built to take care of next year's tourist trade. The fine flow of sulphur water has been almost doubled by means of new pile line and by clearing away of debris and vegetable growth in the spring. A substantial fence will be built and lawns and shrubbery will be planted. Such improvements have been impossible in the past as cars have been allowed to drive in at all points. The dance hall will be remodeled and a gasoline station will be erected on the property.

GERMANY WANTS NEUTRALITY RIGHT IN CASE OF WAR

LOCARNO, Switzerland, Oct. 8.—(A. P.)—Although M. Briand, the French foreign minister, and Dr. Lu-

ther, Germany's chancellor, in the quietude of a secluded spot on Lake Maggiore yesterday had a heart-to-heart talk on the subject how best to bring about lasting peace in Europe, Germany continues to pursue persistently a campaign against permitting German soil to be used as a theater of combat in any possible war among her neighbors.

Such utilization of German territory would be conceivable under the covenant of the League of Nations concerning movements of troops against a warring nation. Both M. Briand and Dr. Luther expressed the determination to do everything hu-

manly possible against future warfare and for an enduring peace. The meeting of the French and German statesmen, was the most outstanding feature of the security negotiations, since they began. It served to inject a high degree of optimism in the observers of the situation here. But Germany still wants the allies as members of the League of Nations to subscribe at Locarno to some undertaking engaging their support to the German interpretation of the covenant of the league which will permit Germany, like Switzerland, to maintain her neutrality. This would mean exceptional treatment for Germany

which the allies feel they are authorized to countenance. The German spokesmen said today that if they could claim the aid of the allies in this respect, Germany would enter the League of Nations without any other reservation. They added, however, that Germany must remain adamant in refusing France permission to guarantee the fulfillment of Germany's arbitration treaties with Poland and Czecho-Slovakia.

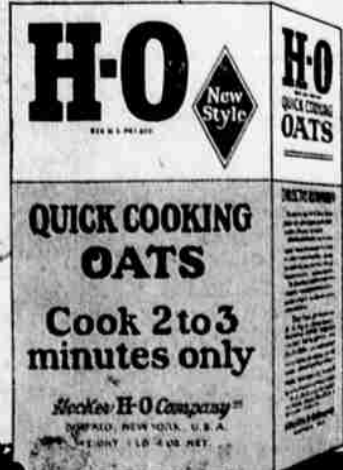
