

MOTORISTS WARNED TO GET HEADLIGHTS FIXED AS REQUIRED

Motorists driving at night with improper lights, or headlights which have not been adjusted in compliance with a recent state law, are subject to arrest according to an announcement made today by State Traffic Officer J. J. McMahon.

Only 35 per cent of the auto lights in Jackson county have been adjusted, said that officer this morning, having received the information from state headquarters, a condition which he labels as being inexcusable as light testing stations in Medford and other county cities have not been rushed for some time, giving ample opportunity for the motorist to have adjustments made. The law has been in effect since September 1st and before that time testing stations were open several weeks in preparation of the anticipated rush, beginning, that time, said Mr. McMahon, allowance for motorist driving with improper lights was made. "But," he said, "that time is past. From now on there will be no grace."

If adjusted, lights on small cars deriving their electricity from magnets, will be allowed the freedom of the state highways at night, the department of state, having recently made a new ruling for the benefit of the owners of such cars.

It is also the law for the motorist to dim his adjusted lights when driving on wet pavements. Arrests for this violation, said the officer, will also be made.
