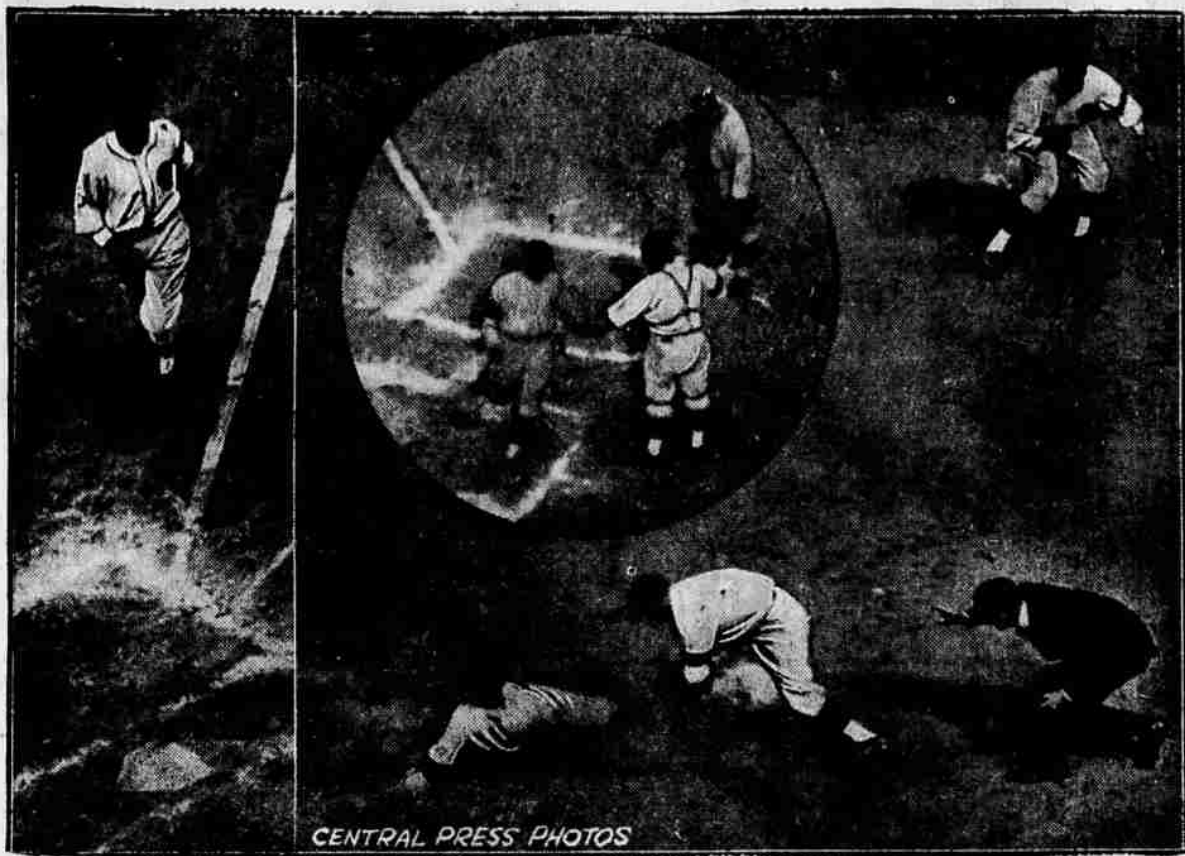


First Photographs of World Series Games

World Series Briefs

PITTSBURG, Oct. 14.—(A. P.)—World series championships have been won many times by a club coming from behind to finish in front, but there is no case on record of a seven-game series where a team made it three straight after being on the short end of a 3-to-1 count—as the Pirates must do to gain the peak today. Washington's Senators themselves won out after trailing at 2-to-3 on games against the Giants last fall, while the year before the Yankees put the Giants to rout in the last three games after dropping two out of the first three to Casey Stengel's batting prowess.

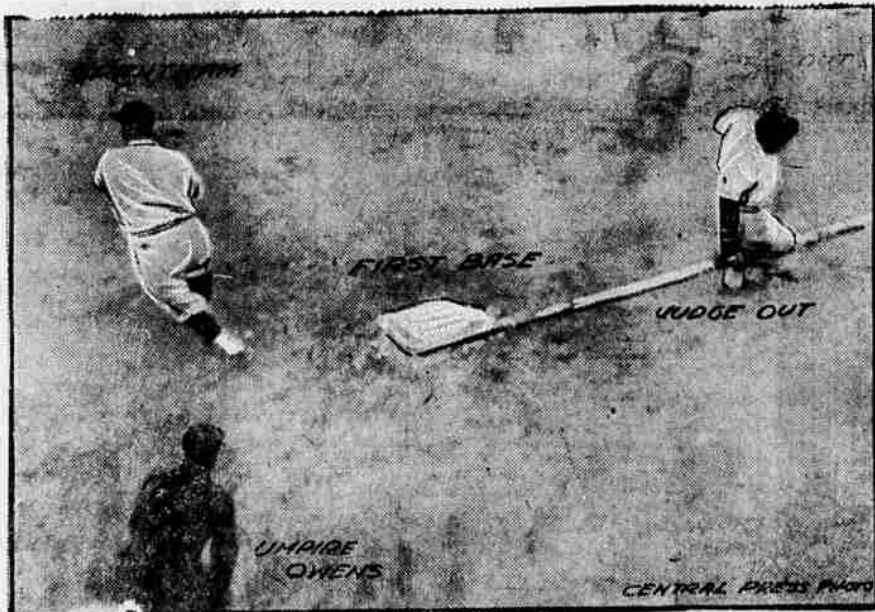
There was a great deal of surprise yesterday when Bucky Harris displaced Ruel behind the plate with Severeid. Ruel is admittedly much stronger than the veteran, while Muddy has been hitting like a house afire, showing a mark of 400, second only to Joe Harris in the Washington list. The Senator manager, however, figured that the change would not affect the strength, since Severeid had shared a good deal of the catching burden with Ruel during the close of the regular season.

Kremer was going great between the second and eighth innings of the sixth encounter. Starting with the last two men to face him in the second, he mowed down 13 straight opponents, then retired four more in succession after passing Goslin in the sixth. Only one hit was made off his delivery in that span, Bluege singling to center but being caught off first a moment later.

Bucky Harris' tumble from the batting heights he reached against the Giants a year ago went so far that he benched himself in the eighth inning and sent Bob Veach to the plate in his place, with two out, McNeely on third and one run needed to tie. Bob grounded out weakly, however, so that this unexpected bit of strategy was useless.
