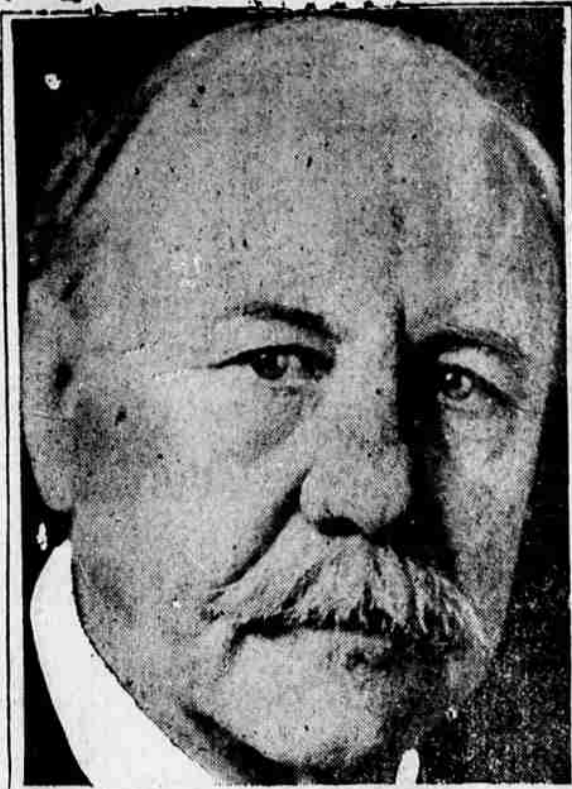

AIRPLANE FLIES FROM DIRIGIBLE

PULHAM, England, Oct. 15.—An experiment in releasing an air plane from an airship while in flight was successfully carried out this morning when the dirigible R-33 took the air with the DH-55 monoplane suspended from a trapeze beneath the hull.
Piloted by Lieutenant R. Lehaga Haig, chief test pilot, the monoplane was released at an altitude of about 2,000 feet and made a successful flight.
After cruising about for half an hour, Lieutenant Haig attached his plane again to the dirigible. He was once more released and resumed his solo flight while the R-33 continued her cruise and later returned to her mooring mast.
