NEW CHURCH TO BE BUILT HERE BY CONGREGATION

Group will be broken tomorrow for the new Seventh Day Adventist church to be erected on Beattie street at an approximate cost of \$25,000, excluding labor, which will be donated by the church members.

The new building will take the place of the old church on North Riverside, recently gutted by fire. It will have approximately twice the floor space, being 52 feet wide and 56 feet long. It will have a heating plant installed in a half basement, a large auditorium capable of seating several hundred people, and will be fitted with new equipment throughout, except for the piano, which was salvaged from the fire.

The new church edifice, which will be erected of reinforced concrete, will be as fireproof as it can possibly be built, and will be situated a short distance west of the private school operated under the direction of the church.

Meelhan and Lockwood will be the contractors and it is expected the construction will have been completed by the first of next year. The property owned on North Riverside, it is planned, will be sold for residence building lots.
