

C. E. GATES TELLS KIWANIS CLUB OF HARBOR PROJECT

Considerable pep was put into the singing at the Kiwanis club yesterday by Carl Loveland of Ashland, a visiting Kiwanian. Carl is a real artist in his line and with Larry Mann and Carter Henson succeeded in getting everybody to sing.

C. E. Gates was the principal speaker of the occasion, telling about the Crescent City harbor project. He said the harbor and a railroad to the coast would be the greatest factor in the upbuilding of southern Oregon and would mean millions of dollars annually for this valley in helping to produce a larger and better market for our surplus fruit, vegetables, lumber and other products. He said on fruit alone from this valley it would save us 50c a box, or about two million dollars a year. He advocated everybody here getting behind the harbor and railroad projects enthusiastically.

Mr. Gates told of the progressive spirit of the 1200 people in Crescent City, and the other 1200 in Del Norte county, and said every one of them are boosters. They have paved streets, recently built a \$65,000 gymnasium for the schools and know how to show their guests a good time.

The river and harbor congressional committee attended the meeting at Crescent City and Mr. Gates says they were all favorably impressed with the prospects for a harbor and declared themselves in favor of the project.

Ben Sheldon made a short talk telling of the former District Forester Cecil's plan to include in the forestry road program the road from Medford via Ruch to the Oregon Caves and on to the coast, said it is a feasible route and Medford should push the project.

New member introduced was Mr. Hamlin of the Medford Pre-cooling and storage company. The guests were: Charles Wolverton, federal judge; C. W. Simon of the Aetna Life Insurance company, C. M. Thomas, judge circuit court, J. D. Russell of Russell's department store and Carl H. Loveland and Ralph Hillings, Ashland Kiwanians.

Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce Boyle told of the project to build a road from Medford to the Oregon Caves with the coast as the objective and said a meeting to consider the same would be held at Jacksonville October 30 at 2 p. m.

An invitation was extended by the Ashland Kiwanis club to all members and their wives to attend a 7 p. m. dinner in the Lithia Hotel Friday, October 23, given by their club. There will be dancing after the dinner.

A report was made on a recent splendid work under the head of Underprivileged child movement, which is a special work of Kiwanians. J. P. Erickson secured the attendance prize, donated by Mr. Hohn of the Medford Grocery company.

ROSE PASTOR STOKES SECURES A DIVORCE WHEN LOVE PASSES

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—(A. P.)—Throwing off the "mantle of shame" which she considers imposed upon her by law, Mrs. Rose Pastor Stokes explains that only the cessation of mutual love has caused her to be divorced.

The Rose of the Ghetto, cigar worker and reporter who 20 years ago became the wife of J. G. Phelps-Stokes, wealthy socialist, and helped him spend his millions in ways that sometimes got her into trouble with the law. In a statement published today, tells who a romance that attracted wide attention ended in a divorce court at Nyack, N. Y., last Saturday, with a decree for her husband on the only ground possible under the New York law.

"Though living under the same roof, Mr. Stokes and I have been purely friends for the larger part of our married life (since the war just friendly enemies)" says the statement written on a battered portable typewriter in an unheated Bronx flat. "Our profound political differences tended to develop situations, domestic and personal, that caused both of us intense suffering and made a continued truce impossible."

A few minutes after the decree was granted, Mrs. Stokes' lawyer appeared in court, saying he wanted to present evidence of extenuating circumstances, but the judge refused to reopen the case. A hotel keeper named Grossman, but not identified further, was named co-respondent.

GIRL EXONERATED OF MURDER BY CORONER'S JURY

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 20.—(A. P.)—After nearly three weeks in jail Lillian Emanuel, on whom the state sought to fix the blame for the death of Maurice Eugene Felt, wealthy realtor, was free today.

She spent last night with her friends and her eighteen months old son, Forest.

For nearly eight hours yesterday, Miss Emanuel in whose home Felt was found mortally wounded with a bullet in his brain on the night of September 29, sat between two guards in the coroner's office and listened to the testimony of a score of witnesses. She fainted twice. Her second collapse came at the end of the day when the foreman of the county jury announced that it found that Felt "died at the hands of a person or persons unknown to this jury."

Assistant District Attorney Kelley announced he would apply for a new warrant charging Miss Emanuel with suspicion of murder.

Fred Felt testified he had met his brother by appointment, found Miss Emanuel with him and that the girl had threatened to "knock off" Maurice if he refused to pay her a sum of money.

YONCALLA STORE IS BURNED DOWN AFTER ROBBERY

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 20.—The destruction of the W. P. Rupprecht general merchandise store at Yoncalla by fire yesterday morning followed a robbery in the store, in the opinion of Sheriff Starmer, who returned last night after a thorough investigation. Evidence obtained from an inspection of the ruins, the sheriff says, indicates that the store was robbed and was then set on fire. One fire was started near the rear door and another near the front of the building. The Yoncalla fire department had a difficult time in checking the blaze and preventing its spread to adjoining structures. The building and goods were practically a total loss and only a small amount of insurance was carried.
