

GRANTS PASS NOT SURPRISED AT ANY THING IN MEDFORD

"On October 20, a hearing is to be held at Jacksonville for the purpose of creating a super-road district, embracing portions of Josephine and Jackson counties, through the efforts of Medford business men," says the Grants Pass Courier. "Of course, Medford can scarcely be censured for wanting a road to the Caves and to join with the Redwood highway, especially if a portion of Josephine county will help bear the cost.

"The super-road district, if organized, will be controlled by the people of Medford and Jacksonville, who will have an absolute voice in saying where the road shall go. The law says that the trustees and officers of the district have the power to designate the road's location. Therefore it shall go where the best interests of Jackson county, not Josephine or any portion of Josephine, shall demand. If it is thought best that it should go up Thompson creek, instead of Williams creek, then it shall go up Thompson creek and the farmers of the lower Applegate, Williams valley and other portions of the county included within the district will pay the cost of building and maintaining it.

"The question arises as to who pays the cost. The law states that the territory included within the super-district shall pay and shall do more than that. The lands must after construction, stand all maintenance charges, for it is not a part of the state or county highway systems.

"The farmers have been told of an agreement by which the road will be built by federal and state funds. Then why the formation of the super-district? If Medford can get the state and federal governments to build such a road, more power to the Bear Creek city. But the matter is open to doubt. And furthermore, if the farmers of Williams creek valley are determined to have the road and think it would be a good thing for them, they should have it in writing that the road will go up Williams creek valley from Provolt and not up Thompson creek, as it has been rumored. We have no delusions about certain interests in Medford. They will seek their own ends first, regardless of who pays the bills."

RALPH COWGILL SUED BY CANAL COMPANY

The Rogue River Valley Canal Co. has filed suit against Ralph P. Cowgill for the collection of \$4339.23, alleged to be due, three causes of action being listed.

The first cause is for \$772.70 alleged to be due for "goods, wares, merchandise, farm products, livestock, cash advances, etc., between December 1, 1916 and April 1, 1922.

The second cause of action is for \$359.17, alleged to be due for water furnished for irrigation purposes, and the third cause of action is based upon the same grounds, for \$3266.46 alleged to be due.
