H. S. CONTRACTOR ALLOWED TO GET OUTSIDE LABOR

A communication from H. J. Hulls, superintendent of construction of the new high school, furnished material for the leading question decided at the regular meeting of the school board last night. He asked for permission, according to contract, to hire skilled labor outside this city, giving the fact that such labor was unavailable here.

Telling board members that it was impossible to find skilled laborers here in sufficient numbers to meet the present situation, Mr. Hulls frankly stated that it is not his purpose to employ non-resident laborers longer than necessary. As soon as a local skilled labor is available, he went on to say, same will be used in the construction work.

According to the building contract no outside labor is to be used unless absolutely necessary and to ascertain if the latter condition exists, representatives from the several labor-unions of the city were invited to be present at the meeting. Individually, they agreed with Mr. Hulls that such labor at present is very scarce in the city and it was their opinion that some outside labor would be necessary at present in the construction of the high school.

When interviewed in connection with the "importation" of laborers, E. H. Hedrick, city school superintendent, stated that in no way was the labor clause in the contractor's contract set to live up to this clause in efforts to live up to this clause.

Mr. Hulls has been turning away laborers daily who could not prove their residence here, and in doing so, it is said, handicapped himself to some extent. He will not "import" labor from Portland, he said, unless necessary, but will employ men traveling through, or as they are sometimes called, "floaters."
