

ADVANTAGES OF NEW 'CAVES' ROAD ARE POINTED OUT

Representatives of all parts of Jackson and Josephine counties are expected to attend the state highway commission's hearing on the Siskiyou highway improvement district to be held at Jacksonville Friday, October 30.

"When this road is completed, it should be, to tourists as well as local motorists will be given the joys of a loop trip. By going to the caves by the Medford and Jacksonville route the motorist will be enabled to leave by way of Grants Pass, or vice versa.

"On the southern end of this proposed road, pavement has been laid from Medford to Jacksonville and several miles toward Rich, affording fine travel. From Rich to Williams creek the road is said to be in very good condition and with the proposed road-building from Williams creek to the caves, the motorist will be afforded an enjoyable trip.

"Another factor to be considered is the ranchers living in the districts where a mountain trail is the only means of transportation. These ranchers, as a matter of fact, are more or less at a disadvantage without the road, and realizing the situation, are very much in favor of the proposed building of the nine-mile stretch.

"The indebtedness caused by the road building will be paid, on the greater part, by Jackson county, only a small portion of Josephine county being included in the bonded district. The city of Medford will be the only county city included in this district, which includes the northwestern portion of the county in the Applegate and Williams creek sections.

"The Medford Chamber of Commerce, which originated the petition for the Siskiyou highway improvement district, will represent this city at the hearing.

2 POWER BILLS GET ON BALLOT

SALFEM, Ore., Oct. 21.—Ballot titles have been prepared by Attorney General Van Winkle for two hydro electric measures, one initiated by the Oregon State Grange through George A. Palminter, state master, and Bertha J. Beck, secretary, the other by the Housewives' Council, Inc., of Portland through Josephine M. Othman, Mary A. Dean and Clara A. Simonton.

The measures differ in some respects. The Grange measure would authorize the credit of the state to be loaned and indebtedness without limitation incurred by the state in addition to all other indebtedness for the purpose of providing funds for carrying out the provisions of the act. The housewives' council measure calls for the creation of the Oregon water power board of five members, and authorizes the issuance of state bonds in an amount not exceeding five per cent of the state's assessed valuation, and an initial appropriation of \$250,000 from the general fund of the state, returnable from a water and power revolving fund.

Both are proposed constitutional amendments. Both look to control of water power by the state.

1925 DEER SEASON BEST IN YEARS, MANY GET LIMIT

The deer hunting season which closed at sun down last evening was one of the best for years in Jackson county and vicinity, with the fleet footed animals larger than usual and in excellent condition. Of course not every hunter got his quota of venison in the hills, but in general most of the hunters were successful, according to local game officials, and more deer were killed in this section than for years past, they say.

In evidence of this are forty to fifty large and exceptionally fine deer heads and antlers in a local taxidermist's place, left there by as many local men this season to be mounted. The last minute deer hunters began arriving in the city last night, the most of them bringing bucks with them. J. Palmer of the Chevrolet Motor company here killed a 210 pound blacktail deer on Parker mountain near Potter's Mill Sunday. The deer was dressed at the time it was weighed. It was accompanied by L. W. Loomis.

Fire Chief Roy Elliott returned yesterday from the Evans Creek district where he had spent several days on an unsuccessful deer hunt with friends. The trip was made in a Ford truck, the rear of which was occupied by a pack horse, as the hunting grounds were several miles from any traveled road.

The chief states that the woods were so full of hunters that a white-tail hunter at any time would be answered by other hunters scattered over the mountain side. The chief's party did kill one deer, but it was utilized for camp meat.
