WALL ST. CLERKS WORKING OVERTIME TO CHECK UP SALES

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—(By Associated Press.) When the battery of tickets ceases its staccato din in the New York stock exchange today, when the excited shouting around the trading posts dies down after the closing gong and comparative silence settles over the canyons in the Wall street district, the day's work really begins for an army of 35,000 clerks. The "tired businessman," and the "battered egg man," may forget the cares of the day at the theater or his supper club in the roaring forties, but the myriad lights in the downtown skyscrapers will twinkle far into the night, signifying that weary clerks are bending over their desks, getting everything in readiness for perhaps another two million share day on the morrow.

"Lunch hours" are unknown in the night clearing house association of the exchange, or in the day time for that matter, for these days of a boiling market. Two o'clock in the morning now is a favorite hour for calling it a day's work. Restaurants in the financial district, ordinarily as silent as King Tut's tomb in the night hours, are packed, night after night, with clerks gulping down coffee or munching at sandwiches as they compare lists of the day's trading and prepare office records.

But complaints are few. These clerks, who seem to thrive in this atmosphere of feverish excitement, know that some day the market will become normal and that Christmas is coming. And at Yuletide brokerage houses distribute exceedingly generous bonuses to the faithful.

Perhaps 30,000 of these clerks are employed in houses connected with the New York stock exchange; the others with the curb and consolidated exchanges. This is a high water mark and the call has gone out for more help.

For a week, Wall street has been witnessing two million share days. The street does not often go through this experience.

GERMAN OFFICIALS REFUSE TO PROCEED AGAINST PRINCESS H.

STUTTGART, Germany, Oct. 21.—(A. P.) Efforts by republican guards to begin proceedings against Princess Hermine, the wife of former Emperor William, for alleged unlawful usurpation of the title "Kaiserin Hermine," have failed.

An attempt to lodge a criminal complaint against her under paragraph 369 of the penal code was made in Nurnburg, but the court there passed the allegations along to another court, which declined to present the charge to the district attorney. Likewise the public prosecutor would not take any action.

It was charged that Hermine designated herself as "wife of his majesty, William II, former emperor." Also it was alleged that she was registered in the list of visitors to the spa at Wildbad as "empress and queen," and that a local photographer issued picture post cards of her with the words "Kaiserin Hermine in Wildbad, 1922," on them.

BOY CONVICTED FOR SHOOTING DEPUTY

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Oct. 21.—A circuit court jury last night returned a verdict of guilty against Jim Burke, charged with assaulting Ed Kendall, ex-deputy sheriff, with intent to kill. Edward Fuller and Charles Fuller, father and son, were convicted of assault with a deadly weapon.

Kendall received a bullet wound in the arm while trying to arrest the trio on liquor charges at Olens last June. Because of his youth, the jury recommended leniency for Charles Fuller.

OLYMPIC GAMES TO BE HELD IN HOLLAND 1928

AMSTERDAM, Holland, Oct. 21.—(A. P.)—Private munificence having virtually assured the holding of the Olympic games in Amsterdam in 1928, plans have been drawn for the construction of a special stadium on the outskirts of the city.

The new stadium grounds will be about 35 acres in size. One of the features that will appeal particularly to the Dutch people will be a mile and a quarter rowing course. Inside the grounds there will be parking for 3,500 automobiles.

NOT BOTULINUS BUT POISON CAUSE OF DUCK MALADY

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 21.—(A. P.)—Wild ducks which died in southern Oregon and northern California from a mysterious ailment apparently were the victims of a chemical poison, rather than bacteria, said Dr. William Levin, who made examinations of two of the ducks at the state public health laboratory here. He said the examinations so far made had failed definitely to determine the cause of the trouble, and that the exact nature of the malady might never be known. Dr. Levin said it had been definitely learned that botulinus was not the cause of the ducks' illness.

One dead duck was brought from southern Oregon, and one duck suffering from the poisoning also was brought. The latter died at the laboratory. Chemical analysis of the soil of Tule lake showed the mud was heavy with hydrogen sulphide, a gas sufficiently poisonous to cause the death of the ducks. But whether the water also was affected by the gas was not determined, as samples sufficient for chemical analysis had not been sent to the state authorities.

It will be some days before a final report on the matter is submitted.

Radio News

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—(A. P.)—Radio has a future in which entire newspapers will be flashed as complete pictures, international broadcasting will be commonplace, entertainment and instruction will be chained a captive.

This is the vision of Major General James G. Harbord, president of the Radio Corporation of America, in an address prepared for delivery today before the conference on education and industry at the University of Chicago by the university and American Institute of eMat Packers.

But in the near future, he thins, there must be an international radio conference "to settle grave issues that cannot be much longer delayed."

"America has taken the lead in radio communication with a total of 60,000 miles with trans-oceanic circuits to many parts of the world," he said. "There are more than 600 radiocasting stations in the United States and the radio business has grown from a total of approximately two million dollars in 1920 to \$350,000,000 in 1924 and to an estimated total of a half billion dollars in 1925."

The problems of the industry and of its future fall into three classes: Technical, commercial and those touching public and governmental relations, he said.

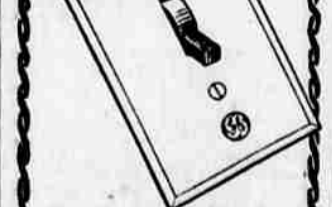

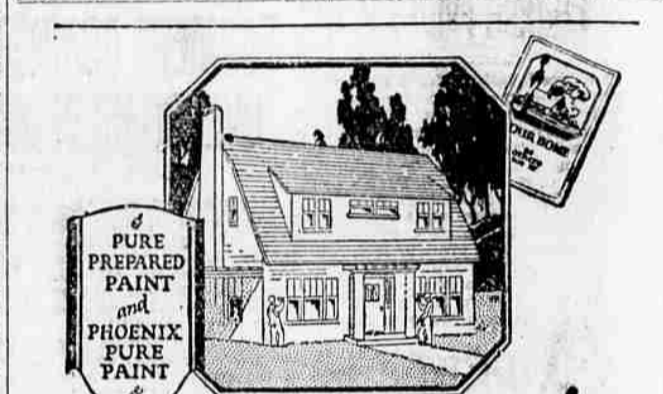
