

### WHAT KIND OF A WOMAN DOES EVERYBODY LOVE?

Last night Wayne Phelps, representative of the World Purity Federation who is giving a series of addresses in Medford this week, greeted a packed house at the South Methodist church. He spoke on the subject, "Can one get a divorce and be a Christian?" The speaker approached the question, which has become one of the foremost of our day from many angles.

He showed the various scriptural bases for separation as he drew from the words of Jesus and of St. Paul. He also showed how many unions could not be blessed of God because they had not the scriptural or Christian basis for a holy bond, and said that "these living together as man and wife are as defiled as the harlots of the Barbary Coast."

Continuing he gave the many present day causes for separation, resorted to, some right and many wrong and unjustifiable. Again and again he stated with emphasis that the marriage bond must be upon the one basis of a life long fellowship. He pointed out the five things which he believed made that basis: Like desires, like tastes, not too much discrepancy in education, like soul aspirations and like spiritual purposes.

Tonight Mr. Phelps speaks at the First Methodist church. His subject is "The Woman Everyone Loves." The meeting opens at 7:30. Tomorrow night he speaks at the First Christian church on the theme, "The White Slave Traffic," which will deal, he stated, with the commercial side of the problem.

### F. W. CARNAHAN DIES IN EUGENE

Word was received today from Eugene, Oregon of the death in that city this morning of Frank W. Carnahan, one of the best known mining men in Oregon, and a resident of this city and county for 20 years. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Carrie Carnahan, and relatives in the east. Announcement of funeral arrangements will be made later.

When the Blue Ledge mine was in operation, Mr. Carnahan was superintendent, previously being identified with the Towne interests in Old Mexico. He was a man of scholarly attainments, and a recognized authority on metallurgy, contributing scientific articles to magazines. He was known to scores of southern Oregon people, being generally beloved and respected.

For several years Mr. Carnahan has not been active in his chosen profession owing to ill health due to a heart affliction, and for the last six months, had been practically bedfast.

BUTTE, Mont., Oct. 22—(A. P.)—Pusses today were searching for Art Mann, who last night disappeared after striking his mother-in-law, Mrs. Frances Randevich, on the head with an axe. The woman is in a hospital in a serious condition. The attack occurred at Mrs. Randevich's cottage on the outskirts of Butte, where Mrs. Mann went to live two days ago following a quarrel with her husband. Mrs. Mann told officers that her husband started to strike her when her mother intervened and received the blow instead.

### AVERILL OPPOSED TO GAME REFUGE UMATILLA COUNTY

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 22—(A. P.)—A tentative recommendation against the proposed game refuge in southeastern Umatilla county will be made by State Game Warden E. F. Averill and Commissioner Baker of Corvallis to the game commission at its next meeting as a result of investigations just concluded, according to the warden.

From information received from residents of the section near the proposed game refuge, the investigators concluded that deer were on the increase there. More deer were killed this season than before, they said. They also found that the winter range is limited and feared that an increase in deer would badly impoverish it. Another investigation of range conditions some time this winter will be recommended.

Then the son of a famous Oregon guard took the ball and bucked center. When the mass was untangled young Mr. Hammond was across the line. He was cheered by both teams, and slapped on the back by Coach Callison.

The rest of the evening practice was devoted to kicking and timing plays, and after the first squad got going they worked like a well greased machine. Weldon McBee, regular center, was out of commission from getting kicked in the ear at Klamath Falls, and action was taken to keep it from becoming cauliflowered.

The locals play Grants Pass at Grants Pass next Saturday, the last of their away from home games until the middle of November. A large number of local fans will attend the contest, and it promises to be one of the best games of the year.

The following Saturday, the second biggest game of the local season will be played with Marshfield. Before the battle there will be a students rally, and the high school band under the direction of Wilson Waite, will be present at the game.

### Jackson County Divorce News

The divorce suit of Alice Finley against Everett Finley, a middle aged couple was heard in the circuit court Wednesday. The have lived for 18 years in the Ross Lane district, on a farm that is valued at \$15,000 by the defense and "nearer \$30,000" by the plaintiff. Three daughters—Alice and Clara Finley, and Mrs. Mary Smith of Central Point testified for the mother. Their testimony alleged that the husband cursed the mother, refused to speak to her and "associated with other women." In the last charge "a widow with five children living in Sam's valley" was mentioned. Finley admitted that he had given her "cups" apples and wheat, and had assisted her in securing a widow's pension from County Judge Gardner.

The defense contends that the domestic trouble, which is alleged to have extended over several years, was brought about by the daughters.

A large number of witnesses from the Ross Lane district were called as witnesses by both sides.
