

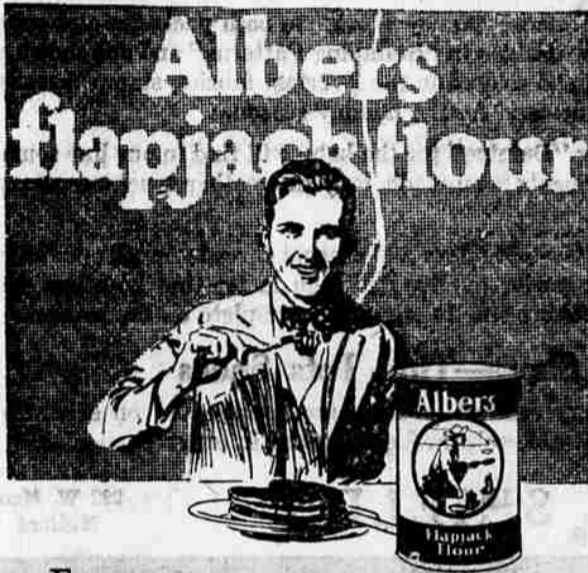

TRAVEL INCREASES ON REDWOOD HIWAY MORE THAN PACIFIC

The Ashland-Klamath Falls highway is showing a healthy increase in traffic, this amounting to 147 over last year, with 617 cars using that road, figures obtained in a check taken Sunday by the highway department show. Oregon cars were greatly in excess of the others, there being 499 Oregon cars and 98 from other states.

The count on the Pacific highway a mile south of Medford showed a total of 284 machines. This was chiefly local, with 2364 cars having Oregon licenses and 446 being from other states. There were 21 light trucks, 8 heavy trucks, 15 motorcycles and one horse-drawn vehicle.

Another point on the Pacific highway where through travel is checked is south of the junction of that highway and the Ashland-Klamath Falls road. There were 938 cars counted there, of which number 481 were Oregon, 431 from other states, 10 light trucks, 9 heavy trucks, 2 motorcycles and 4 horse-drawn vehicles. This was an increase in the total of 234 machines. Redwood highway traffic is increasing at a faster rate than on the Pacific out of Grants Pass, the count taken Sunday shows. On Sunday 1095 machines passed the intersection with the Pacific highway, this being a gain of nearly 200 over the same day last year when 811 cars were counted. The Pacific highway south of the intersection showed a total of 1357 vehicles, or only 352 more than the Redwood.

Of the cars using the Redwood highway, 854 had Oregon licenses, showing evidently that this was mostly local traffic. Other states numbered 71, light trucks 54, heavy trucks 19, motorcycles 5 and horse-drawn vehicles 11.

The Pacific highway north of the junction showed an increase of only 27 over last year with a total Sunday of 2159. Of these 1695 were Oregon, 340 other states, 82 light trucks, 25 heavy trucks, six motorcycles and 11 horse-drawn vehicles.

RECLAMATION IS MOST PERPLEXING PROBLEM IN DEPT.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—(A. P.)—The problem of obtaining settlers for government reclamation projects was declared by Secretary Work in reviewing his department for 1925 to be the most difficult of all reclamation problems. He pointed out that the consensus of opinion is that construction of new work should be deferred until this question is solved.

"The essential part of the federal reclamation policy of the future," said Mr. Work, "is a program of land settlement and farm development. Unless settlers can be attracted to the projects and are able to remain on them there is no reason for building them, and the government will not be reimbursed for their cost. The government constructs irrigation projects, but it cannot draft settlers."

"One solution of the settlement problem is co-operation between the federal government and the states in which the projects are located, the states to assume the responsibility of settlement. Any new settlement must be based on the selection of settlers who have had experience in farming and who have sufficient capital to underwrite advances made by the government. Financial aid to settlers at a low rate of interest for clearing the land, improvements for the farms and purchase of necessary equipment is also paramount to success. Until these problems of land settlement and farm development of the old projects can be solved, the consensus of opinion is that the construction of new works should be deferred."

62 YEAR PAYMENT PLAN TO BE NEXT OFFER BY FRANCE

PARIS, Oct. 22.—(A. P.)—Belief that a new plan which Finance Minister Caillaux proposes to submit to the American debt commission would involve larger annual payments than previous French proposals was general in political circles today.

On the other hand it is known that M. Caillaux feels that even the temporary arrangement offered by Secretary Mellon would be better than any plan involving higher payments unless such a plan carried some sort of insurance against the crippling of French financial resources. In view of the fact that many members of the French parliament are vigorously opposed to the temporary arrangements which M. Caillaux brought home from Washington, this arrangement will not be submitted to parliament. Instead, there will be a new proposal which is expected to be a definite refunding measure covering 62 years.

This proposal will be forwarded shortly, probably soon after the reopening of the chamber of deputies next Thursday.

Although at the recent radical congress in Nice, there was some demand that France would undertake to pay no more on her war debts than she received in German reparations, the belief prevails that M. Caillaux will not consider this when he next approaches Washington and also that he will not attempt to couple up war debt payments with the reparations.

GERMANY DELAYS LOCARNO ACTION

BERLIN, Oct. 22.—The German cabinet under the chairmanship of President Von Hindenburg today concluded its deliberations on the report of the German delegates to the Locarno security conference.

Because of difficulties which might have arisen between the nationalist cabinet members and their party, up vote was taken, but Chancellor Luther and Foreign Minister Stresemann were authorized to present the government's views at this afternoon's meeting of the reichstag's foreign affairs committee. It is learned that while the nationalist cabinet members personally sanction the work of the Locarno delegates provided the allies keep their promises, it was considered inadvisable for the cabinet to come out with a positive endorsement while negotiations still are going on in an attempt to win over the nationalist party leaders.

LIQUOR SHIP IS ALLOWED TO GO ON UNMOLESTED

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 22.—(A. P.)—The motorship Quitchow, believed to have been loaded to her scupper tops with what is now known as "real" Scotch, sailed right into San Francisco harbor today, turned around and sailed right out again, and all under escort of the coast guard.

The rum chaser No. 255, bobbing around in the roadstead off the Golden Gate, sighted the Quitchow at dawn. She had been long sought as a rum runner. The little chaser took her in as a prize and put all of her crew under arrest.

Once in the port the skipper of the Quitchow asserted himself. He talked hard and fast. He said that he had been taken outside the 12-mile limit and he proved it.

There was nothing for the 255 to do but escort the Quitchow back to sea again, which the little chaser did gallantly to the accompaniment of a rollicking drinking chanfey from the hurricane deck of the late prize.

2 MORE ARRESTED IN SOVIET RAIDS

LONDON, Oct. 22.—(A. P.)—Walter Hanington, leader of the national unemployed workers' committee movement, and Robert Page Arnot, secretary of the labor research department of the communist party, were arrested in raids today on the communist headquarters here. Eight others previously arrested will be arraigned tomorrow. All will be charged with seditious conspiracy in violation of the incitement to mutiny act of 1897.

As part of the campaign to rid the country of reds, nine Russians with their families have been deported from Scotland within the last few days.

Ma Ferguson Refuses to Notice Criticisms

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 22.—(A. P.)—Governor Miriam A. Ferguson has not and will not issue any statement concerning the intimation of Lee Satterwhite, speaker of the lower house, that he may call the Texas legislature in special session. This declaration was made here today by James E. Ferguson, husband of the governor. Satterwhite in Washington Tuesday announced unless the governor did so he would call an extra session to investigate the alleged state highway and other irregularities. Mr. Ferguson returned today from Houston, where he conferred with bankers on reimbursing owners of cattle slaughtered to stamp out the foot and mouth disease.
