Their story of the break was practically the same as that told by other witnesses except they said the first shots were fired by the guards and not by the escaping convicts.

Denies Warden Fired
Fullen and Arthur contradicted the testimony of Warden Dalrymple, who said that after running to his house for a gun he got behind some oil barrels near the garage and fired three shots at the fleeing convicts just after they came over the wall at tower one. Both said that they saw the warden come out of his house with the gun, but declared that at that time the three fugitives were halfway across the field between the asylum and the prison, out of gunshot range and that the warden did not fire.

C. M. Charlton, former principal keeper at the prison, testified that he had placed Willis in the bull pen at the latter's own request.
