

### ROUSING MEETING BY LEGION FOR PROGRAM NOV. 11

One of the best local American Legion meetings in months was held last night by the Medford post, with large attendance and much interest displayed in all matters which came up for discussion, particularly the coming Armistice day celebration.

Reports of the various committees showed the results of careful plans having been formulated and preparations already under way for this important event. A novel advertising scheme will carry the message of the coming Armistice day celebration far and wide.

Among important topics up for discussion was that of the legion golf course which, it would seem, is destined to enjoy a brilliant future. A canvas of the members for legion buttons was made, each "comrade" whose lapel was not adorned with this emblem being fined forthwith. It is expected that in the future all members will appear fully "decorated."

A good showing was made when 30 members paid their 1925 dues in advance, in response to an appeal by Paul McDonald of the membership committee to put Medford post "over the top" in an endeavor to lead the state in this regard. A report by Dr. Kress of the child welfare committee was heard, as was also a report on post colors by Seeley Hall.

Two newcomers to Medford were introduced, "comrade" Stewart and "comrade" Wellington, the former being associated with the Southern Oregon Gas company and the latter being the new manager of the 20th Century grocery on Central avenue. After a few remarks by Commander McKelrose regarding the coming election of officers, the post adjourned to the dining room, where a "feed" was enjoyed, thanks to the efforts of the ladies' auxiliary.

### Chime Clock Is Being Installed on Jackson Co. Bank

Workmen today began installing a beautiful chime clock on the corner of the Jackson County bank building. This clock which chimes every fifteen minutes has four 30-inch dials, is as accurate as human skill can devise and is a gift of the Jackson County bank to the citizens of Medford. This clock weighs nearly a ton, is illuminated at night and can be seen and heard from anywhere in the downtown section.

The six sacred words, "Lord through this hour be Thou our guide, so by thy power no foot shall slide," have chanted down through the century, the original melody being played in the tower of the famous West Minister Abbey and since duplicated wherever chimes are heard. This public time piece is a permanent expression of a desire on the part of the Jackson County bank to be of unselfish service to the entire community. In telling the story of time, the clock is fittingly placed on the oldest bank in Medford.

In speaking of the bank's gift to Medford, an official of the bank said, "It is hoped the chimes will mean something to all the people, that they will have a message for the youngster on his way to school, a thought for the business man and an inspiration for all."

The clock is a produce of the O. B. McClintock company of Minneapolis, exclusive manufacturers for chime clocks for banks, similar clocks have been installed for over 3000 leading banks throughout the United States.

### ROBINSON FLEES WITH RIFLE, AFTER HELD AS DRUNK

James Robinson, local auto mechanic, who forfeited a \$25 cash bail last week on a charge of intoxication, was again arrested last night in an inebriated condition at DeVoe's confectionery by Policeman Leggett and Officer Prescott, but later escaped while in the custody of Deputy Sheriff Lewis Jennings, who was taking Robinson from the city jail to the county jail at Jacksonville. Robinson is still at large and is armed with a rifle he had procured at his home while occupying.

City police are much exercised over the fact that Robinson has threatened to do members of the police force bodily harm, Joe Cave especially, who arrested him last week. He made these alleged threats both while being sober and under the influence of liquor during the past week.

When arrested last night he had in his possession a bottle of lemon extract, one-half of which was consumed. After being in the city jail a short time, Robinson turned on a water faucet, flooding the entire interior and also soaking his clothes. Police, believing that to stay in the jail in such condition would tend to bring on sickness, turned him over to Deputy Jennings. In compliance with Robinson's request, Jennings allowed him to go into his home to change clothes while Jennings watched outside, but instead of returning Robinson left by the back door with his rifle, and since has not been seen.

Saturday night Robinson was on the street intoxicated and would have been arrested at that time had it not been for the earnest pleadings of his wife, who promised to take him home at once.

He formerly operated a repair shop on the corner of Eighth and Front streets, but for some time has not been in active business. He has also been a resident of Medford for many years past.

### MAN IS NABBED TWICE, 10 MINUTES, ON SPEED CHARGE

Being arrested twice for speeding in approximately ten minutes was the fate of Seth E. Hodge, traveling salesman, who was one of the three traffic violators hauled before Judge Glenn O. Taylor this forenoon by State Traffic Officers C. P. Talent and J. J. McMahon.

Hodge, according to the officers, was traveling at a rate of 50 miles per hour when first arrested near Talent and ordered to appear in court today. Taking his place at the end of a long line of cars, all of which were going the limit, the officers left and returning a short time later to the end they discovered that Hodge was gone. After having followed him some distance the officers overtook him going at a rate of 45 miles an hour, and as a result was again arrested.

This morning when he pleaded guilty in court he was fined \$20 on the first charge and \$15 on the second, with a warning from the court that his drivers' license would be suspended should his arrest occur again. Others who paid fines were from Ashland and Medford. C. J. Brommer of Ashland paid a \$15 fine for speeding and N. Woid of this city was fined \$10 for driving at night with no tail light.

### NAB 70 MOTORISTS FOR BRIGHT LIGHTS

If they do not adjust their lights in compliance with the recent law by next Friday, 70 motorists will be brought to court charged with driving with improper lights following warnings received last night from State Traffic Officers McMahon and Talent.

The two officers, stationed at Riverside avenue, stopped all motorists last night driving with faulty lights and to each issued a slip to appear in court if same are not adjusted by Friday. Fourteen of those stopped were from Ashland, while the rest were from Medford and other county points.

"It is up to the car owners to

have their lights adjusted if they wish to stay out of court," said Mr. McMahon today, "and we might as well say that we will put on these 'light raids' every night until the law has been complied with in this section of the state."
