WILLS VICTOR OVER JOHNSON, TOWEL HURLED TOO SOON

NEWARK, N. J., Oct. 27.—(A. P.)—Harry Wills today had a quick but indecisive one-round heavyweight victory over Floyd Johnson to his credit. While 16,000 spectators in the First Regiment armory yelled "false," a towel was flung unexpectedly from the corner of the boxer who had been heralded before the match as the "lowa bulldog." What was to have been a 12-round no-decision event ended two minutes after the opening of the first round.

Johnson appeared to the spectators to be far from out without the towel fluttered. He was on his feet and had not been knocked down. After the match a physician representing the state boxing commission examined Johnson and declared he was fit. "I was punch drunk," said Johnson. Wills entered the ring weighing 215 pounds, 12 pounds more than his opponent. The negro immediately carried the fight to his opponent, striking a left to the stomach and then bringing the same hand up to the head. A right-hand wallop to the head then drove Johnson to the ropes. He had his hands up in defense when the towel was flung.

SPORT BRIEFS

(By the Associated Press.) Fidel Labarba's first defense of the flyweight ring title he recently lifted from Frankie Genaro in California, may be an international battle. Ernie Jarvis of England, who is fighting in this country, has received an offer to meet Labaraba on November 24. Washington college of Chestertown, Md., is credited with producing the football season's "heaviest lineman," kenman, right guard, scales 320 pounds. Tiger Flowers, the Georgia negro middleweight, rates the title of the "Iron man of boxing." Only last Friday night he handed Jack Malone a smashing at St. Paul, and he's scheduled to go 10 rounds with Chuck Wiggins at Indianapolis at East Chicago tonight. His manager expects to have him in action in Boston Friday night, making three contests in seven days. The little town of Manassa, Colo.

will bestow high honor on its noted former resident, Jack Dempsey, by naming the new high school, now under construction, after him, according to word received by Chicago admirers of the heavyweight champion. The school is being built on the lot where the log cabin in which Dempsey was born, once stood.

An interview in the current issue of Collier's quotes Iturb as placing his losses "as a babe and as a fool," at \$250,000. Gambling cost him \$125,000; business failures \$100,000; lawyers and detectives \$25,000.

Tex Rickard, who has paid out many small fortunes to pugilists, has vetoed the proposed return match between Harry Greb and Mickey Welch, because of the former's requirement for a \$50,000 purse. Rickard plans to substitute a featherweight bout between the champion, Louis (Kid) Papayan and Babe Herman.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 27.—(A. P.)—Thomas L. Turner, president of the Portland club of the Pacific Coast Baseball League, announced today the purchase of Johnnie Couch, right-handed pitcher from the Philadelphia National league club. Couch

formerly was with the San Francisco club of the coast league. He was sold to Cincinnati in the winter of 1921-22, and has since been with major league clubs.

SCHULMERICH, O.A.C. TRAVELS 245 MILES STAR, IS INJURED PER, AERIAL RACE

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 27.—Wes Schulmerich, mainstay of the Oregon Agricultural college backfield, and Bell, fullback, in the pony combination, are out of the game for an indefinite period as the result of injuries suffered in the Stanford game last Saturday. For a while yesterday it was feared Schulmerich's leg was fractured, but an X-ray revealed a torn ligament. He may be back in the lineup for the Montana game next Saturday. Bell's injury is more serious, and is expected to keep him out for most, if not all, of the season. Post-mortems on the Stanford game since the return of the squad revealed

that the Aggies had a powerful and smart offensive, but it was pointed out that they lacked a hard game preceding the Stanford clash to add finish to the teamwork.

BAYSHORE PARK, BALTIMORE, Md., Oct. 27.—(A. P.)—Lieutenant James H. Doolittle, United States Army, set a mark of 245.713 miles per hour in speed trials over a three kilometer straightaway course this afternoon—the fastest time ever made by a seaplane. Lieutenant Doolittle flew the little black Curtiss racer in which he yesterday won the Jacques Schneider trophy. Doolittle's time is a world record which will become official when recognized by the Federation Aeronautique Internationale.

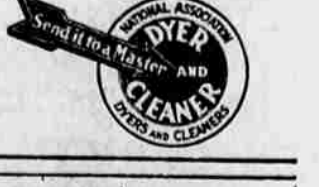
