

### MAN CONVICTED OF BOOTLEGGING SUED FOR DIVORCE

R. Dawson of Klamath Falls, sentenced last week by Circuit Judge C. M. Thomas to serve two concurrent sentences of three years in state prison for perjury and liquor operations in connection with the operation of "The Hut" last June on the Crater Lake highway, has been sued for divorce in Klamath county by his wife, Mrs. Dawson, who is ordered by the court to pay \$75 a month for their support as soon as he is free again.

Mrs. Dawson and Mrs. Hughes, whose husband is in the county jail pending an appeal of his conviction on a liquor charge, were both tried and acquitted at the June term of court of complicity in the operations of their mates.

The divorce complaint alleges that Dawson is a convict and that pleadings of Mrs. Dawson to cease bootlegging operations were ignored.

Dawson was found guilty by a jury on the moonshine charges and plead guilty to perjury charges, which grew out of a signed statement made shortly after his arrest and which he later denied.

### J. DURANDO FREED ON LIQUOR CH'GE, SCOTT CASE UP

Jack Durando, on trial in the circuit court since Monday morning charged with "possession and sale of liquor," was acquitted by a jury Tuesday night, after five hours deliberation.

It was the first case on the docket for the present term of circuit court. Durando has been in the county jail several weeks awaiting trial. The defense was represented by Attorney E. E. Kelly, and the state by District Attorney Newton C. Chaney and Assistant District Attorney Allison Moulton.

The case of Willis Scott, indicted on a charge of driving an auto while intoxicated, will go to the jury this afternoon.

The next trial on the calendar is that of Walter Williams of Gold Hill, 19, charged with a statutory offense.

It is in this case that was the basis of two indictments returned by the last grand jury, charging a felony and a misdemeanor, against Deputy Sheriff Forncrook. Forncrook is alleged to have followed custom in the handling of juveniles, and accepted the promise of the boy's parents, under bonds as material witnesses, to bring him to Jacksonville the next day. In the meantime, young Williams fled to northern California. He was later returned. The grand jury after hearing the evidence of Forncrook and other witnesses and perusing the jail records, brought in true bills. Forncrook afterwards entered a plea of guilty to the minor charge and was fined \$50, the same being suspended.

On account of the background of the case, it is creating considerable interest throughout the county.
