## HEALTH NURSES MEET NOV. 7TH, IN THIS CITY

Public health nurses of southern Oregon will meet in the public library, Medford, on Saturday, November 7th. Nurses are expected from Douglas, Coos, Deschutes, Klamath and Jackson counties.

Dr. W. R. Adams of Medford, and Dr. Estella Ford Warner of Salem, director of child hygiene in the Marion county child hygiene demonstration, are the program. Several papers are being prepared by various public health nurses regarding different phases of county and school nursing.

Mrs. Glendora Blakely, state advisory nurse with the state board of health, and Miss Grace Holmes, director of surveys for the Oregon State Tuberculosis association, are planning to be present. Miss Mildred Carlton, president of the Jackson County Health association, Mrs. H. L. Noblit of the county association, and Miss Leah Jennings, county nurse, are making arrangements for the entertainment of the guests. Mrs. Bertha Denton, school nurse for Medford and Ashland, and Miss Vera Beard, county nurse, are in charge of the meeting. This conference will be open to the general public.

#### The Enemy Within Our Gates.

To the Editor: We hear on every side that the war is over, but the revolution is yet to come and has begun; that things are not right, and property is not distributed according to the universal requirements. We need not be told that we are living in strange times. A sickening war-weary world sees with horror the eastern country all lit up with a sinister glare. We fully realize that red anarchy is already applying its torch over one-third of the world, and that this grim spectre is steadily mounting its way westward, boldly boasting that it will soon have Christian Civilization throttled.

Soviet Russia, with its black flag of anarchy has raised rebellion against every non-communist country. We have some Americans who wish to cooperate financially and politically with this Russian government, giving its strength to carry out the announced purpose to introduce into the United States the system, enthroned in Bolshevik ridden Russia. In fighting this cause in congress recently John Reed said: "Bolshevism is socialism put in practice," while Senator Goff's definition of socialism is: "That socialism is Kaiserism standing on its head and trying to rule the world with its feet." In this same controversy the senator from West Virginia makes clear that "the call of the hour is for a sane and unselfish citizenship."

Trotsky said on June 2, 1925, in a speech before the Council of People's Commissars: "Our most dangerous enemy is the United States of America. We must bend every effort to destroy it."

Zinoviev, chairman of the Communist Third International, and the most powerful man in the Moscow government, says: "We have exterminated the capitalists and property owners in Russia. We are going to do the same thing to the intelligentsia of Europe and America."

From 1917 to 1920 the bolshevik leaders murdered two million Russians. During three months in the Crimea, alone 120,000 official executions took place. It is estimated that from 1917 to 1923 three and a half million people were "officially" killed. From 1917 to 1922, one organization, the cheka, killed without trial 600,000 people. As punishment for threats against the life of Lenin, 3500 men were shot to death in prison. The Moscow government called this "collective retribution."

Letzts, the red terror leader, said: "We exterminate not merely individuals, but the bourgeoisie (middle class) as a class. Don't look into our records for evidence of the criminal action of accused persons. Their fate is decided by the fact of what class they belong to, what education they have gotten. This is the essence of the red terror."

Professor Sorokin, of the University of Petrograd, estimates the number of persons executed in Russia between 1917 and 1921 at 1,758,457. This number includes 6000 teachers, 5000 physicians, 70,000 policemen, 12,550 land owners, 355,000 intelligentsia (educated class), 195,250 workers and 815,000 peasants. This does not include the unrecorded executions.

The Krasnaya Gazeta, bolshevik organ, said September 1, 1918: "Let us murder by thousands. Let our enemies choke themselves with their own blood. Kill as many as we can. For one of their heads they have to pay many thousands of their heads." In view of the record and attitude of murderous soviet Russia, it seems inconceivable that any American would wish to establish closer relations with that so called government. Bolshevism would destroy all that man has gained in his struggle toward God; and would leave us a civilization with morality and religion left out, which is not worth preserving. Bolshevism abolishes the fundamental principles of liberty and civilization and makes of this world a fool's paradise, where the rogues and the criminals reign supreme.

It is well known that the underlying principle of the bolshevik program is destruction by violence of all governments where religion, family and private property are permitted to exist and its agents are actively engaged in stirring up revolution against all such governments, including our own, the United States of America, and that this program also contemplates the slaughter or enslavement of all foes or critics of bolshevism.

## OWEN-OREGON TO ERECT A \$50,000 OFFICE BUILDING

Plans are being considered by the Owen-Oregon Lumber company for the construction at an early date of a \$50,000 office building, at their plant in this city.

The building will be two-story, 100 by 75 in dimensions, and Gothic in design. It will provide quarters for every branch of the company's operations in southern Oregon.

The offices themselves will be the last word in equipment, with plate glass partitions, wickets, mahogany desks, and scientific lighting and ventilation systems.

There will be a lawn around the building, with landscape decorations. The site for the building has not been selected, but will be on the mill property.

The executive committee, of which John S. Owen of Oshkosh, Wis., is the head is expected to meet early next month to approve and consider the plans made for a \$500,000 improvement program of the local plant, operations on same to start in the spring.

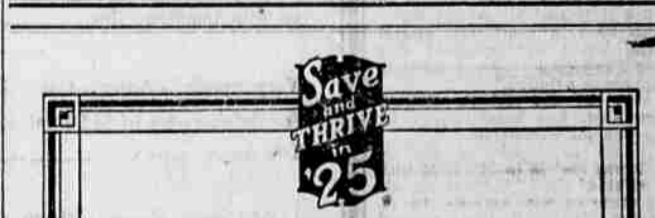
