

**ARMLESS WONDER  
TO GIVE BILLIARD  
FANS EXHIBITION**

George H. Sutton of Chicago, Ill., better known as "Armless" Sutton, will arrive in the city tomorrow from Portland to stage several billiard exhibitions at local billiard parlors during the remainder of the week.

Even though Mr. Sutton has no arms, both having been cut off at the elbow when he was 3 years old, he has defeated several of the world's champion billiard players, including Hoppe. In straight rail billiards he holds the world's record run of 3069 points, and in 18.2 ballkine he holds a record of 739, made in match play. His nearest rival is Horemans of Belgium, who made 701 in unofficial play. He has also defeated Koji Yamada, Japanese champion, in match play.

For 28 years Mr. Sutton has been playing billiards, and though he is physically handicapped, he can make masse shots with ease and can use the "bridge" with dexterity.

Beside billiard playing he can golf, if lengthened sticks are available, and it is said he can play a good game. He is a good pistol shot, having won several prizes for marksmanship and one time was on the stage featuring target shooting.

He is also a penman, using the Spencerian style of writing, and can do rapid cartooning. He drives his own car with a horse body, using no special equipment while driving, and has been in practically every state in the union in his "house on wheels." Before obtaining the car he operated a house boat, built by him and his wife alone.

He is so versatile that he has even written short stories, and has also been a practicing physician.

armaments and future wars." Reason for Force.

Recalling that the first Pan-American conference was held almost exactly 100 years ago, President Coolidge said that since then "the history of relationships among the nations of the new world has been a continuing story of efforts to substitute the rule of arbitration, of mediation, of adjudication, and confidence for the rule of force and war."

"To the scholarly statesmanship of the Latin-American nations, the world owes a debt which it has been too tardy in acknowledging," he said. "The truth is that they have demonstrated a peculiar genius in the realm of international accommodation and accord."

"The high and humane doctrines of international relationship which were expounded by such men as Calvo, Drago, Alvarez, Bello, Bay and Rosa, Rio Branco and a long list of others are now recognized universally. The record of arbitrations, mediations and adjudications among the Latin-American countries constitutes one of the fairest pages in a century's story of mankind's effort to eliminate the causes of war. Among their international treaties we will find models of effective covenants for the limitation of armaments and the prevention of strife in arms."

**COL. MITCHELL WINS OPENING**

Colonel Mitchell's Hawaiian report, which was read to the court as a part of the challenge against General Summerall, was dated December, 1923, and declared the air forces of the islands were badly organized, and that General Summerall had shown an ignorance of the principles involved. In an appended statement by Colonel Mitchell, also read in court, the colonel said the report had indicated that General Summerall "knew practically nothing about aviation."

A copy of the report, Colonel Mitchell said, had been handed by him to General Summerall.

The case in behalf of Colonel Mitchell was opened by Mr. Reid with the reading of the statements of the air officer made in San Antonio, Texas, September 5 and 9, charging "criminal neglect," "incompetence" and "almost treasonable" administration of the air service. It is upon this language that Colonel Mitchell is being tried on charges of "conduct to the prejudice of good order and military discipline."

These statements, Mr. Reid declared, did not constitute a violation of any article of war.

With Colonel Mitchell standing before the bench, Lieutenant Colonel Joseph I. McMullen, assistant trial judge advocate, then read the specifications against him.

Representative Reid of Illinois, attorney for the defendant, characterized the action against Colonel Mitchell as against "every principle of American law, military or civil."

He reviewed the statements made by the court, charging criminal negligence in administration of the army and navy air services, and insisted that these statements were permissible under the constitutional guarantees of free speech.

"You will have to admit," Mr. Reid told the court, "that the soldier has rights under the constitution which cannot be taken away. The question is:

"Are soldiers' people within the meaning of the constitution?"

The defense claimed there were limitations upon free speech such as sayings which fostered anarchy, constituted libel or were obscene or immoral, but they did not say since Colonel Mitchell had not been charged with any of these crimes.
