

### MID-WEST SHIVERS AS SNOW COVERS ROCKY MTN. AREA

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—(A. P.)—Under a blanket of snow, the midwest and Rocky Mountain region today faced the prospect of continued cold with a cold wave in southern Missouri, Illinois and Indiana.

The white covering, which broke records in Milwaukee and extended to Colorado, was nearly an inch thick at Helena, Mont., and a half foot or more in many sections of Iowa.

Accompanying the snowfall were dropping temperatures reaching two degrees above zero at Havre, Mont., the coldest spot in the country yesterday, and hovering around the freezing point in the corn belt region. Kansas expected from 15 to 20 degrees above zero today, and Omaha looked for 20 degrees.

The low temperatures in northeastern Colorado caused businessmen and schoolchildren to turn out in aiding farmers' efforts to save the beet crop, valued at \$500,000.

Some reaction will set in tomorrow, it was forecast, in the northern Rocky Mountain region and northwestern plains area which, like the snowfall, will move eastward to the western Great Lakes region and thence toward the east which so far has escaped with scattered rains.
