

HIGHWAY COM'N LUNCHEON HERE TOMORROW NOON

When the members of the state highway commission arrive in the city tomorrow from Roseburg to attend the state highway commission's hearing on the Siskiyou highway improvement district to be held at Jacksonville tomorrow afternoon in regard to the feasibility of the proposed super-road district from Williams to the Oregon caves, they will be given a luncheon at Hotel Medford as guests of the chamber of commerce.

The highway commissioners, who are William Duly of Baker, chairman; H. B. Van Duzer of Portland, W. H. Malone of Corvallis and Roy A. Cline of Salem, secretary and state highway engineer, together with representatives of the various service clubs of the city, members of the county court, directors of the chamber of commerce and representatives of Williams, Ruch, Applegate, Grants Pass, Provoit and Jacksonville will be present at the luncheon.

The hearing will commence at 2 o'clock at Jacksonville following the luncheon, where the representatives of the southern Oregon cities and districts will give the advantages of the proposed building of the nine-mile stretch of road.

The Kiwanis club, which holds regular meetings on Wednesdays, postponed yesterday's meeting to Friday to attend the luncheon and hearing.

LOCAL MERCHANTS TO CLOSE AT 11 ARMISTICE DAY

Judging from the many favorable reports of the various American Legion committees in charge of the Armistice day celebration, Medford will witness on Wednesday, November 11, one of the biggest patriotic events in the history of southern Oregon. Extensive preparations are already under way, some committees having definitely outlined their programs several weeks ago.

The entertainment program promises to excel anything ever before attempted in the city, starting at 9 o'clock in the morning and continuing for the rest of the day and into the night. Many free features are scheduled to take place in the open air, with Main street as the stage. Mirth-provoking comedy stunts, athletic exhibitions, drills and sham battles will serve to fill the intervals between the big events of the day, or which there are said to be many.

Merchants will keep their establishments open until 11 A. M. for the benefit of the out-of-town visitors desiring to shop, and at the same time to offer special sales for the occasion. Stores will close at that hour to join in the commemoration of armistice hour, being fittingly observed by a two-minute cessation of all activities, followed by the blowing of taps by a special band corps of 20 pieces, and in turn followed by daylight fireworks.

From present indications the parade, the next number of the program, is going to be a long and elaborate procession, the majority of organizations and business establishments of the city being represented. The legion is offering many prizes for the most appropriately decorated floats and cars. It is expected that the competition will be keen in efforts to secure the silver cups and cash prizes offered.

At 1 o'clock, following a short intermission for luncheon, outdoor stunts will entertain the assembled throngs until 1:30, when the scene of celebration activities will shift to the Hotel Medford, where the fire department will stage an interesting exhibition and fire drill. Wall scaling, net jumping and other "thrilling" events will tend to show citizens how a modern fire department functions. The new Stutz pumper will also demonstrate its powers.

The football classic of the year will commence a half hour later at the new high school athletic field, when Medford and Ashland meet in conflict. For those who do not desire to attend the football game, interesting programs have been arranged at the theaters, vaudeville at the Craterian and motion pictures at the Rialto. More street stunts will also be staged following the game.

The American Legion drum corps is scheduled to parade Main street and put on an exhibition drill shortly before the annual armistice ball at the Oriental Gardens. The ball is expected to be the crowning success of the day and efforts are being made to have it eclipse all other similar balls. The hall will be appropriately decorated, while a "French village" in the small hall of the Natatorium will be open as something entirely new and novel in the entertainment line. The dance will start at 8:30 and the "French village" will open at the same time.

Medford Rotary Club News

INDIANS GATHER VIA MOTOR CARS, FEATHERS SCORNE

SPOKANE, Oct. 29.—(A. P.)—History was being re-enacted today in Spokane, but with a decidedly modernized aspect.

As in the old days, the Indian tribesmen of the Pacific northwest are gathering for their encampment beside the falls. But unlike the days of half a century ago, the braves and their squaws are arriving not on cayuseback with trailing wickiups but in six-cylinder automobiles or by first-class railroad transportation.

Chief Black Eagle of the Nez Perce, one of the three tribesmen who called on President Coolidge earlier this month with an invitation to attend the northwest Indian congress here tomorrow and Saturday, is in town, but he is not hovering over a camp, but fire smoking a meditative pipe, or parading in paint and feathers for the edification of the white man.

This morning, attired in a neat business suit and patent leather shoes, he was enjoying the modern luxury of the Davenport hotel lobby. Someone wanted the chief to attire himself in the historic Indian costume.

"He never wore one," Superintendent O. C. Lipp of the Nez Perce agency replied, "and he doesn't care to."

HI-JACKING OUTFIT LANDED IN JAIL

ASTORIA, Ore., Oct. 29.—One man is in jail here and another in the hospital as the result of what officers declare was a hijacking escapade last night. The incident, officers believe, is connected with the finding last night of a fully outfitted fishing boat drifting in the Columbia near Flavel by the customs patrol boat Robert N.

The officers refuse to give out the names of the men.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Oct. 29.—(A. P.)—The west Texas conference of the Methodist Episcopal church voted today against unification with the northern church. The vote stood 177 for and 87 against unification.

Three-fourths majority was necessary.

ARDMORE, Okla., Oct. 29.—(A. P.)—The west Oklahoma conference of the Methodist Episcopal church south today voted 144 to 29 for unification with the Methodist Episcopal church.

GOVERNORS DEMANDS U. S. FARM EQUALITY

MADISON, S. D., Oct. 29.—(A. P.)—Governors of six middle western states today gave notice that legislation giving "agriculture equality with industry and labor in the American protective system" must be enacted if the American protective tariff is to be retained.

In the opinion of agricultural leaders meeting here with governors of this area, this position is a reply to Secretary of Agriculture Jardine, who was represented to the conference as considering demands for farm relief legislation as the views of a minority of farm leaders in Iowa.

WESTON VICTIM OF A FRAME-UP, SAYS GOVERNOR

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 29.—The 19-piece of 30 days, granted by Governor Pierce to Allan MacLaren, Portland youth under sentence to the state penitentiary for a statutory crime, is in no way to be construed as meaning that pardon has been granted, the governor stated here today.

"During the 30 days time I intend to have a thorough investigation made of the case," Governor Pierce said. "If there are any circumstances that would warrant a pardon, however, no pardon has been granted."

Governor Pierce confirmed the resignation of the older MacLaren, who is a member of the parole board. Regarding the Weston pardon, Governor Pierce said: "Weston was the victim of a cold-blooded frame-up."

PRISONER ESCAPED ON EVE OF PAROLE

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 29.—(A. P.)—Bert A. McGillis, who with George Temple escaped from McNeil's island federal prison yesterday, would have been set at liberty on parole had he waited a few days longer instead of throwing away his chance by a break.

Deputy United States District Attorney Allan Elyon had recommended the young man to the attorney general's office for parole and received information from Washington that the department had acted favorably on McGillis' case almost simultaneously with the news of the break from McNeil's.

State Can't Sell Gas.

MITCHELL, S. D., Oct. 29.—(A. P.)—F. W. Marman, state director of gasoline sales, today ordered all state operated gasoline stations to cease immediately the sale of motor fuel.

The action came as a result of the opinion handed down yesterday by the state supreme court, holding that the retail of gasoline by the state is unconstitutional.

GHASTLY DISCOVERY ON UNION PACIFIC TRAIN

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 29.—(A. P.)—The leg of a man, found wedged in the truck of a car on the Union Pacific train which arrived here Monday morning from the east, may have been part of the remains of a man who was killed sixteen miles east of Huntington, October 16.

Railroad officials today received a telegram from Pocatello, Idaho, stating that a newspaper there printed a story indicating that the victim may have been John Tyler, who met his death that way.

If this solution is correct officers said the leg was carried to Chicago and back past the scene of the accident to Portland before it was discovered.

BANKER WITNESS FOR R. R.'S ADMITS FIGURES

CHICAGO, Oct. 29.—(A. P.)—Philip Benson, Brooklyn, N. Y., banker, who previously had been a witness for the western railroads seeking a five percent freight rate increase, under cross examination today said he and associates had authorized publication of a statement quoting an estimate of increased earnings of \$3,000,000 for the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul road in 1926 without any change in rates.

Herman L. Eckern, attorney general of Wisconsin, one of counsel opposing the railroads, read into the record the published statement made by the Roosevelt committee of minority holders of securities of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul, now in receivership, of which Benson is a member.
