Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—(By Associated Press.) Violent fluctuations in the motor shares, many of which were elevated to the highest prices of the year only to forfeit a substantial part of their gains in the last few minutes of trading, featured today's active stock market.

The closing was irregular. New specialties were brought forward, including Commercial Solvents "B", International Business Machine and National Lead which rallied four to seven points but "General Electric, Southern Pacific, Tobacco Products and Schulte" turned heavy. Sales approximated 2,500,000 shares.

SAYS GERMANY WILL SIGN PACT AND CAN KAISER

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—(A. P.)—Early action by the German reichstag upon the Locarno pact was forecast today by Paul Loebe, president of that body, when he sailed on the Hamburg-American liner Deutschland.

"I believe the Locarno agreements are so important to the peace of Europe," he said, "they should be accepted by the German republic, and I shall throw all my strength and power toward this end."

Mr. Loebe said with the acceptance by Germany and the other interested countries of the Locarno pact the enmity between Germany and France which has existed for one hundred years, will be at an end.

Germany will be in the League of Nations "where she properly belongs, by the end of the year," he asserted.

"On the issue of a possible restoration of a monarchy in Germany," Mr. Loebe said, "the kaiser cannot come back—in the first place, because of the interior political situation in Germany, and secondly, because of the entente and pressure from without."

"We have organized in Germany more than one million workers who would not hesitate to go to war to prevent a restoration of the monarchy."

EX-KLAN GOBLIN PAINTED AS FIEND IN MURDER TRIAL

NOBLESVILLE, Ind., Oct. 29.—(A. P.) The story of Madge Oberholtzer's mother was put into the record today in the trial of D. C. Stephenson, Earl Klenck and Earl Gentry, in connection with the girl's death.

The mother told the circumstances of Madge's departure from home on Sunday night, March 13, the date on which the state alleges the young woman was abducted and of her daughter's return, harassed and injured the following Tuesday afternoon.

Mrs. Eunice Schultz, roomer at the Oberholtzer home, picked up the narrative shortly before noon and related additional incidents of the girl's return in the custody of a man who said his name was "Johnson, of Kokomo," but whom she identified as Earl Klenck, one of the defendants.

NOBLESVILLE, Ind., Oct. 29.—(A. P.) Mrs. George E. Oberholtzer, mother of the girl Madge, for whose death D. C. Stephenson, Earl Klenck and Earl Gentry are on trial here, took the stand today as the state's first witness.

Charles E. Cox of the prosecution, in the opening statement, charged Stephenson, former grand dragon of the Ku Klux Klan, with having a dual personality and with being a veritable "Dr. Kekyll and Mr. Hyde, and a seducer of women."

Mr. Cox said evidence would be introduced to show how the girl was called to Stephenson's home by a ruse, forced to drink, taken to a train and assaulted enroute to Hammond, Ind. The state would also show, he said, how the girl had been offered an opportunity to marry Stephenson the day following and that she refused.

Employees of the Indiana hotel at Hammond, Cox said, would prove that Stephenson and Gentry registered there but that Stephenson used another name.

"The principal witness for the state will be Madge Oberholtzer, the dead victim," said Mr. Cox. "Under an exception to the rule which generally excludes hearsay testimony, Madge Oberholtzer will tell you, so far as possible in the circumstances, the story of her entrapment, of her being drugged, kidnaped, assaulted, beaten and of the taking of deadly poison which contributed to her death."

Following Mrs. Schultz the prosecution called Dr. John K. Kingsbury, family physician of the Oberholtzers, who testified that he was called to attend Miss Oberholtzer March 17. Dr. Kingsbury related a story as told to him by Miss Oberholtzer similar to the alleged dying statement signed by her and admitted at a bail hearing last June.

The doctor repeated the story which covered the period from the time she left her home Sunday night, until she was brought home Tuesday.

Bulgarian Premier's Brother Assassinated

VIENNA, Oct. 29.—(A. P.)—Danezo Tsankoff, brother of Premier Alexander Tsankoff of Bulgaria, has been shot and killed in Sofia while walking on the street.

Dispatches from Sofia describe the motive for the crime as unestablished. The slayer escaped. Tsankoff was walking with his wife and sister-in-law when shot.

The Tsankoff brothers were estranged. Danezo Tsankoff was a member of the Sobranje.
