STRANGE PROVISION IN DIVORCE DECREE MAY RELEASE WIFE

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—Because of an unusual provision in a divorce decree that separated her husband and his first wife, Anne Murdock, believes she can have her own marriage annulled. She is now suing

to recover \$150,000 in securities she lent him. Harry C. Powers, her stockbroker husband, and his first wife, Florence Grell, were divorced 12 years ago in Nevada. The decree gave him custody of a son now 17, and provided that the son should never be taken within 100 miles of New York.

Attorneys for Miss Murdock, who is suing under her real maiden name of Irene Anne Coleman, claims that this provision has been violated and that the divorce therefore was automatically nullified and Powers' secret marriage in November, 1924 consequently is void because he still

is married to his first wife. In the meantime, the first wife has re-married.
