

**MRS. STILLMAN  
FILES A DIVORCE  
AGAINST HUBBY**

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—(A. P.)—Mrs. Anne U. Stillman, who defeated James A. Stillman's sensational prolonged suit to divorce her, has now begun suit to divorce him.

Papers were filed in Westchester county more than a month ago and the action was kept secret. It is expected that no witnesses will be introduced in Mrs. Stillman's suit, but that a certified transcript of the testimony in her husband's suit to divorce her and illegitimate Guy Stillman as the son of Fred K. Beuvais, a French Canadian Indian guide, will be offered as evidence.

Mrs. Stillman fought her husband's suit by countering that he had misconducted himself with Mrs. Florence H. Leeds, that her son, Jay Ward Leeds, was in reality the son of Stillman, and that Mrs. Leeds actually was Florence Lawler, an actress, who quit Broadway for sudden affluence.

Most of the floors are cement. Window panes are needed everywhere. There is no heat in the building other than that given off by the packed-in bodies of the students. The teacher stands on the cement floor, dressed as for a sleigh ride, administering mental food to a crowd of poorly clad pupils."

That is where American old clothes come in handy. "Thanks to 1342 garments just received," one worker wrote from Djani-Oghit, "we look all dressed up in complete outfits of clothes. Legs, unfortunately, remain a problem. In spite of 224 pairs of new stockings and 376 pairs of shoes, not new, but reconstructed, many feet are still bare, or little better, in stockings only."

**3362 Scout Camps Last Summer.**  
NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Approximately 312,119 boy weeks of attendance were registered at the 3362 camps conducted by the Boy Scout organization last summer. The figures appear in a report just issued by the National Scout Camp department.

In the annual campaign to make "every scout a swimmer," 19,667 scouts were taught to swim. Outstanding progress in all water-front activities is reported.

The buddy system for swimmers as a means of insuring water safety has been adopted by 244 coast-guard camps. Junior life guard organizations have been installed in 206 camps. Red Cross life guard emblems are that each life guard must be an expert swimmer, who has rendered credible service under a qualified Red Cross life saving member.
