

JACKSON COUNTY AFTER PRIZES AT LIVESTOCK SHOW

Jackson county will be well represented at the Pacific International Livestock exposition, which opens Monday at Portland, thru its exhibits entered by the boys and girls' clubs, and general attendance of county residents.

Three of the boys clubs, those of Central Point, Talent and Independence, will have an exhibition at the big show five pens comprising 22 head of the choicest, fattest, pure bred hogs of the county, of three breeds, Berkshire, Poland China and Durocs, with average weight of 200 pounds, all superior pigs which will be entered in the competition for prizes.

It is generally deemed heretofore that this collection of local pork aristocrats has a fine chance of capturing first prize, in competition with similar exhibits entered by the boys clubs of the entire northwest.

At last year's livestock exposition at Portland the second prize was won by the exhibit made by boys clubs of Jackson county, against 33 competitors from the northwest.

This year's Jackson county exhibit entered in the Boys clubs division at the exposition does not contain so many pigs as usual, as there is a shortage of pigs all over the county, due to the fact that pork, brought poor prices last year, and local raisers did not go in for them so heavy this year.

Eight members of the Jackson county boys clubs will be in attendance at the exposition including the five boys who are owners of the pork exhibit, which won first prize at the recent county fair. These five boys are James and John Lathrop and Earl Head of Central Point, Edwin White of Independence and Elton Petrie of Talent.

In addition the first prize winning stock judging team at the county fair, consisting of Harold Fish of Talent and Ralph Howell and John Billings of Ashland will be there. The team that took second place in stock judging at the county fair was sent to the state fair at Salem.

The girls clubs will also have representation at the livestock exposition, as the prize winning pruned bread baking demonstration team, consisting of Adena Joy and Ellen Galey of Ashland will be present endeavoring to win further laurels for themselves and Jackson county.

County Club Leader Robert Fowler left this noon to attend the exposition and County Agent C. C. Cate will leave for Portland tomorrow and Sunday, and general Jackson county visitors will be stringing along for the big show during the next few days.

2 MEN INJURED IN AUTO CRASHES, CARS WRECKED

W. D. Thompson, proprietor of Thompson's Paint Store, is at the Sacred Heart hospital suffering from contusions about the left shoulder as a result of an auto collision this morning at the intersection of Third street and Central avenue, while William Hood is at his home at Central Point suffering from a broken collar bone and numerous lacerations about the face and body, received when he was struck by an auto driven by H. G. Warner of Tacoma, Wash., yesterday afternoon on Main street of that city. In addition, two minor auto collisions were reported at the police station today.

Because he could not see through his windshield coated with frost and dew, Mr. Thompson, driving his light delivery paint truck at a moderate rate of speed, collided with a milk truck driven by B. F. Van Dyke. As a result of the impact Thompson was thrown on the pavement, dazing him somewhat. Both cars were badly damaged. Milk and milk bottles were also scattered in all directions near the scene of the collision.

In a few days Mr. Thompson will be able to leave the hospital, where, according to reports, he is rapidly recovering from the effects of the accident.

Mr. Hood, injured at Central Point, was removed to his home from the hospital the same evening he was brought there, and is resting comfortably today.

According to Mr. Warner, this accident was unavoidable. Hood was carrying a sack of grain on his shoulder and was attempting to cross the street at the time he was struck, having suddenly emerged from the rear of a parked car, giving Warner no opportunity to avoid him. TURKS FORCED TO ABANDON FEZ ON ORDER OF POLICE

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 20.—(A. P.)—"Wear a European hat or go barehead," was the edict of the day when the second anniversary of the proclamation of the Turkish republic was celebrated yesterday as a national holiday.

All business houses were closed by order of the police; the city was flagged, parades were organized and there were fireworks during the evening. But what mattered most was the manifestation of the abolition of the fez and the kalpak to mark Turkey's emancipation from ancient traditions.

A few persons who disregarded the warning to wear hats had fezes or kalpaks snatched from their heads and torn to pieces. The police complacently watched the destruction.

The hat dealers during the last few days have done a rushing trade. They sold any old thing of a western make. A majority of the people seemed to favor tweed caps and some of those sold were the oddest of shapes and the weirdest of colors. The wearers look profoundly uncomfortable and unhappy in them.

BROOM ACQUITTED ON LIQUOR CHARGE

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 30.—Mark Broom, tried by a circuit court jury on a charge of setting up a still, was found not guilty in a verdict returned late yesterday evening.

Testimony against Broom was all circumstantial and Broom's defense was the testimony that he was at a rooming house in Albany at the time the deputies made a raid on the upper McKenzie and located a still.

Witness arrested after testifying in liquor trial.

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 30.—"We have another witness we want to introduce before we rest our case, but he is not here—oh, here he is now," exclaimed attorney for Mark Broom, alleged moonshiner, during Broom's trial in circuit court here.

The district attorney and a deputy or so gasped. The witness was McKenna T. Pickert, the man shot by deputies in a raid upon a still near the state fish hatchery on the McKenzie river, March 31, and who was afterward sentenced to jail, but ran away when working on a trusty gang at the county fair grounds.

After Pickert had testified for Broom, deputies stationed themselves at the door of the court room and placed him under arrest. He had been sought since his escape, but this was the first trace officers had obtained of him.

Pickert was serving out a \$1,000 fine and a six months sentence when he fled.

WAR DANGER IN EUROPE LIES IN BOLSHEVIK RUSSIA

LONDON, Oct. 30.—(A. P.)—Ramsay MacDonald, former labor premier of Great Britain, returning home from a tour of central Europe, told the Herald's Brussels correspondent that although the Locarno agreement was welcome as a first step, it in no wise settled the real problem of Europe.

"The real problem is in the east," Mr. MacDonald is quoted as having said, "and the Locarno pact does not touch it. If war is again to devastate Europe it will come from the east. To face this danger is the most urgent problem of European statesmen."

Mr. MacDonald said he talked with statesmen and other leaders of opinion in Vienna, Budapest, Prague, Berlin and Paris while on his trip.

"I am profoundly impressed with the persisting state of unsettlement in central Europe," he declared. "Political instability, financial chaos, economic unsettlement and misery grow worse as you go farther east and south. Tariff barriers prevent a return to stability and prosperity. The new frontiers are only accepted with a gnashing of teeth by the vanquished nations. Nationalist exasperation is breeding a dangerous spirit of chauvinism and fascism and social reaction."
