

WAR VETERAN IN REAR ATTACK IS NEARLY BLINDED

After having served through the world war in the navy without a single serious mishap befalling him, beyond a delayed pay day once, John Winterhader was the victim of a foul liquid gas attack, which temporarily blinded him, shortly after midnight last Saturday night in the Eagle Point desert district.

Hence the blinking John rode back to the city on one running board of a car and a large, dead skunk on the other running board, and his companions, George James, Harold DeVoe and Joe Harrell, local high school students, inside the car with their noses closed and bawling John out all the way for his reckless carelessness.

That is why the latter three did not attend Sunday school yesterday as usual. However, they turned up at high school this morning garbed throughout with new raiment. Winterhader was able to use only one eye last evening in making change and working the cash register at DeVoe's.

The above mentioned happening was the result of a fallow deer ride for relaxation when the DeVoe confederacy store closed at midnight. Knowing that the territory they were to pass through is infested with skunks, John Winterhader, who is a crack shot, and has a horror of being attacked by wild beasts, took his .22 caliber rifle along.

In passing over the desert a skunk ran across the road in front of the car, which was promptly stopped and the four young men hastily took up the pursuit. The animal ran fast. So did they with John in the lead with his trusty shooting iron.

When he was within five feet of the skunk John drew a bead, and both pursuer and pursued fired simultaneously, the animal falling dead with a bullet back of the ear, which spot John always selects in hunting. "I'm blinded," moaned John as he staggered into the arms of his companions, rubbing his eyes.

First aid was rendered and then all hurried back home with the dead animal, which Harold DeVoe insisted on taking, to build him a fur colored overcoat. Each of the boys slept in the garage at his individual home the rest of the night, and DeVoe carefully put the trophy in his garage.

"When Pa DeVoe came back into the house Sunday morning from the family garage and sat down to breakfast, he said: "Mother, we must change the brand of gasoline we've been using. It has an awful odor."

"I am on my way south, from a trip over the Pacific highway close to the end at Vancouver and Victoria, B. C., and I find the keenest sort of interest all along the line in the idea of increasing the volume of tourist travel from the south," said Capt. Harry L. Wells this morning, who passed thru Medford with Mrs. Wells in their car. JURY DISCHARGED IN WILLIAMS CASE AFTER 53 HOURS

The jury in the case of Walter Williams, 17 year old Gold Hill youth charged with a statutory offense involving a 16 year old girl of the same city, was discharged Sunday afternoon at five o'clock by Circuit Judge C. M. Thomas, after being out 53 hours. They were reported hopelessly deadlocked, six to six, throughout, and returned no verdict. Though no definite announcement has been made, the case will probably be retried at the close of the present term.

The deliberations of the jury set a new record for Jackson county the longest previous record being 37 hours' deliberation in a liquor case, three years ago.

As one of the side issues of the Williams case, Deputy Sheriff Fornoreok was indicted by the last grand jury, and pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor charge.

The case, which attracted wide attention, and according to a statement by the district attorney's office "involved the entire town of Gold Hill" and centered about small town gossip, which grew and grew, until official action was taken.

The trial of H. Conway, charged with the possession of a still, in the Ashland district, was begun this morning.

The trial of Hyman Huntley, charged with murder in the first degree, for the alleged killing of Jesse James Gibbs, in a family row last September, will be called on Thursday, according to present plans.
