

TAMMANY SURE OF VICTORY IN NEW YORK CITY

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—(A. P.)—Governor Al Smith's battle for a new democratic mayor of New York was before some 1,200,000 voters today for decision. The voters of the entire state passed upon his efforts to amend the state constitution.

Tammany Hall was highly confident of electing as mayor, State Senator James J. Walker, former song writer and sponsor of legislation permitting boxing and Sunday baseball and movies. Tammany predictions of Walker's plurality ran from 300,000 up. Walker was a 15 to 1 favorite in speculation. Some republican spokesmen predicted the election of the republican candidate, Frank D. Waterman, manufacturer and a novice in politics.

Predictions over four constitutional amendments were not so certain as in the mayoralty fight, though confidence was expressed by their supporters. One would provide a \$100,000,000 general public improvements bond issue, another a bond issue of \$300,000,000 to eliminate grade crossings and the other two would make possible state administrative and judiciary reforms.

Governor Smith has stumped the state for them, saying that as he intends to retire to private life, he wants them to be his heritage to the state in gratitude for the honors it has shown him.

Although there has been some republican machine opposition to the amendments, several leaders of that party have endorsed all or some of them. Former Governor B. B. Odell, republican, last night reported his approval. Republican opposition has been against the proposed bond issues.

The campaign for the amendments has been overshadowed by the mayoralty fight in the city. William Randolph Hearst several days ago endorsed Walker and yesterday he came out with a criticism of the governor, saying he had made the mistake three times of supporting him for governor and that three times was too many. The publisher accused the governor of always making deals with the big interests.

ASKS PRESIDENT TO FIRE THREE TRADE OFFICERS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—(A. P.)—Basil M. Manley, director of the people's legislative service, in a letter to President Coolidge made public today, makes his demands for the resignations of Commissioners Van Fleet, Hunt and Humphrey of the federal trade commission for "incompetency and wilful neglect of duty," in "pressing further investigation of the \$400,000,000 bread merger."

The commission on Saturday published a report from its chief examiner recommending that the inquiry into the reported merger plans of the General Baking company, Continental Baking and Ward Baking companies, be held open, but that no action be taken at this time because of the absence of any definite information that such a merger was contemplated.

The commission has not announced any action in the case.

KLAN AND LIQUOR ISSUES TODAY IN 3 CITY ELECTIONS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—(A. P.)—Prohibition and the Ku Klux Klan furnish the issues in some of the more spectacular of the election contests which are to be decided today in thirteen states.

The wet and dry question is right at the front in the New Jersey gubernatorial contest with Harry Moore, the Democratic candidate, declaring for modification of the Volstead act and repeal of the state enforcement act and State Senator Arthur Whitney, republican, favoring enforcement of both of those acts.

The Ku Klux Klan has been raised in the mayoralty fights in Detroit and Louisville, Ky. Prohibition also has figured in the Detroit contest.

In the Detroit non-partisan election, supporters of Mayor John W. Smith have accused Charles Bowles, the opposition candidate, with being a Klan candidate. Bowles denies he is a member of the Klan and charges that Detroit is a "wide open" town which he promises to "clean up."

Injection of the Klan issue in the Louisville mayoralty fight had an unusual result, William T. Baker withdrawing as the democratic candidate within 48 hours of the election after the republican committee had offered a reward of \$1000 if he could prove he was not or never had been a Klansman.

Joseph T. O'Neil, former judge of the state court of appeals, replaced Baker as the candidate against Arthur A. Willis, republican.

Two seats in the house of representatives are at issue in today election with the republicans seeking to retain control over that from the Third New Jersey district and the democrats seeking to keep that from the Third Kentucky district. Frank T. Appleby is running in New Jersey for the seat made vacant by the death of his father and is opposed by J. Lyle Kenmouth, democrat.

Thurman E. Dixon, democrat, and John W. Moore, republican, are contesting in Kentucky for the place in the house made vacant by the death of Robert Y. Thomas.

New York, Kentucky, New Jersey and Virginia are to elect members of the state legislature, while the voters of Pennsylvania will fill one state office. Constitutional amendments also were voted upon in New York and Ohio.

Boston furnishes a special mayoralty contest, unique in the number of candidates offered for the place, seven democrats and three republicans. At one time seventeen were in the field.

Kansas City, Indianapolis and Pittsburgh are among the other cities where contests for mayor are up while San Francisco is to decide the question of purchasing a municipal street railway and elect supervisors and three other officials.
