## COUNTY SHORT OF ROAD FUNDS, CURTAILS WORK

Apple week was observed by the Kiwanis meeting Monday, not only by hearing about the apple industry, but by feasting on elegant Spitzemburg, furnished by C. C. Lemmon and nice apple pie by the Medford hotel.

Mr. Lemmon made a short talk on "The Apple." He said: "Production up to September 1 this year in the United States is 30,394,000 bushels—there are three boxes to a bushel—which is one and a half million more than in 1924. The largest crop for years was in 1923, when 34 million bushels were raised. On the coast, Washington leads this year with 25 million; Oregon, 5 million; Idaho, 4 million; Colorado, 3 1/2 million.

So far this year a million barrels and one million boxes of apples have been exported, which is larger than last year.

"This year 450 cars of apples have been shipped from this valley, which

### CONWAY'S TRIAL ON LIQUOR CHARGES. READY FOR JURY

The trial of Henry Conway, charged with possession of a still, is under way in the circuit court and will be given to the jury this afternoon.

The chief witnesses against Conway are Dan Stonebreaker, a member of a well known Ashland family, and his wife, who testified yesterday. Stonebreaker alleged that Conway, Jack Durando, acquitted of a liquor charge last week, and himself, last summer engaged in the bootlegging business in this city and Ashland, and told of the manufacturing process, plans and division of the profits.

He was subjected to a severe cross-examination by Attorney Gus Newbury for the defense, but stuck to his story. Stonebreaker has pleaded guilty to a similar charge.

Mrs. Stonebreaker, on the witness stand corroborated her husband's story and told of liquor sales, and profit divisions at her home. She alleged that Durando was the sales agent, and her husband and Conway colored the moonshine, and filled orders—mostly in pint bottles. The stuff sold at \$3 a pint or \$15 a gallon, it was testified, the preference being for the smaller lots.

Mrs. Stonebreaker also said that when they lived on Manzanita street, this city, a pair known as "Mutt and Jeff" frequently called for liquor.

The jury hearing the case is composed of 11 men and one woman—Mrs. F. G. Swendenberg of Ashland.

The next case on the docket is that of J. S. Wheaton, also charged with a liquor violation.

Following this trial, the case of Hyman Huntley, charged with first degree murder, as a result of the death last September of Jesse James Gibbs, will be called and is expected to last ten days.
