## CARDS CONSIDER HUSKIES STRONGER THAN CALIFORNIA

STANFORD, Cal., Nov. 4.—(A. P.)—Stanford's powerful gridiron machine, flying the blazing red banner of leadership in the Pacific coast conference, will steam out of its home area tonight in search of new fields to conquer. But the quest will soon end. For at Seattle the Cardinals are due to clash with the Washington football eleven next Saturday. That juggernaut of the north also is undefeated and equally determined to keep its conference slate clean. Stanford only assumes top position in the conference race by virtue of three victories and no defeats. Washington has won two games and lost none. California rounds out the trio of undefeated teams with no conference losses and one victory. It is the belief of the Cardinal coaches that if Stanford is going to be defeated by a college eleven this year, that defeat will come at the hands of the University of Washington next Saturday. Therefore, Coach Glenn Warner this week has drilled his men for their hardest game of the season. In their 35 to 12 defeat of Oregon last week, the Cards proved that they are essentially an offensive team. They scored five touchdowns against the northerners and should have had one or two more. Oregon, however, was able to slip across the goal upon two occasions and in so doing made the red shirts look pretty bad, defensively. Against O. A. C. the previous week, Stanford's defense was weak and ragged despite the fact that the Aggies went home with the short end of the score. This problem of defense, consequently, has been presented in liberal doses by Coach Warner for three days.
