Hence the city planning commission will meet tonight in City Superintendent Davis' office to reorganize, as the term of O. C. Boggs, chairman of that body since it was inaugurated, has expired and Dr. R. H. Johnson, who was recently appointed to the commission, has resigned because of being unable to devote the necessary time to such duties.

In place of Mr. Boggs the mayor appointed George Porter, and to replace Dr. Johnson, another well-known citizen, Charles Boyce, was appointed. The term of Mrs. A. E. Moore having expired, she was reappointed by the mayor. The new city budget committee has the same personnel as last year's budget committee with the exception of J. C. Mann, who replaces James Riley on the committee, because of the latter's removal to Corvallis. The following well-known business men are on this committee: V. H. Sawyer, C. E. Gates, J. C. Mann, L. 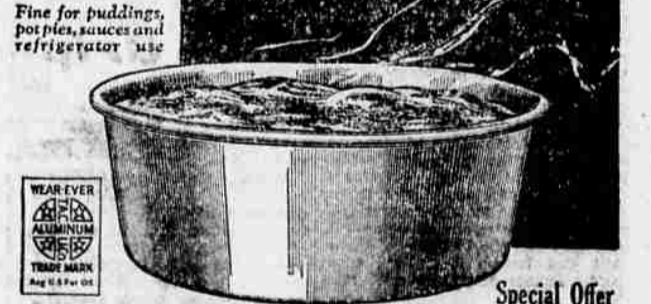
