

### PREMIER KING TO KEEP PLACE, SPITE OF ELECTION LOSS

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 5.—(A. P.)—It is the purpose of W. Mackenzie-King, the premier, to go before parliament with his cabinet, notwithstanding the fact that the liberals, of which party he is the leader, are in the minority of the house of commons in consequence of the recent general election.

This announcement was made last night by Mr. King in a lengthy statement, in which he took the ground that although the conservatives, led by Arthur Meighen, had 116 seats in the chamber as against 102 for the liberals, this was far from indicating that Mr. Meighen was in a position to command a majority of the 254 members. In fact, Mr. King added, the results of the election "appear clearly to indicate that he is not in such a position."

The statement was issued after several conferences with the governor-general.

### METHODIST UNION LIKELY TO FAIL

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 5.—(A. P.)—Including the vote of three conferences yesterday, the combined vote of thirty annual conferences in the Methodist Episcopal church today stood at 2968 for King and 2171 against unification with the Methodist Episcopal church, making final passage appear improbable.

Yesterday's votes were: East Oklahoma 140 for, 18 against; North Mississippi 43 for, 166 against; Louisiana 117 for, 74 against.

Three-fourths of the total vote in the southern church is required for unification to pass. The vote is now 88 in the required majority.

Thirteen conferences are set to vote, the total vote being expected to reach only about 8000.

### OVER MILLION FISH PLANTED IN DOUGLAS

ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 5.—A total of 1,617,265 fish were planted in lakes and streams of Douglas county, the eggs having been hatched in the Rock Creek trout hatchery, according to the report filed by Superintendent T. H. Hill with the state game commission. The hatchery handled 2,041,230 with a loss of 35,961. There were 1,869,658 fish hatched of which 25,451 were lost.

The hatchery planted 431,069 steelhead trout; 41,006 black spotted trout and 1,145,130 rainbows.

The heavy losses, according to Mr. Hill's report were due to delays in transportation and high temperature and low water during the summer.

### FASTING QUICKENS BRAIN, EXPERIMENT IN CHICAGO SHOWS

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—(A. P.)—Mental ability and alertness are retarded during a long fast but suddenly increase, often above normal, when eating is resumed, it is learned in psychological tests conducted at the University of Chicago by J. A. Glaze on himself, his wife and Frederic Hoozel.

The experiments were conducted at the time Hoozel, who holds the world record of 32 days for experimental fasting, went through his month of prolonged hunger. At the same time Glaze fasted 17 days and Mrs. Glaze ten. The tests show that the hand is steadier and the brain clearer after the fast than before and during it.

Other observations were:

Dreams are more numerous in longer fasts than shorter ones.

One sleeps less during the fast, though a much longer time is spent in bed than normally.

The sense of smell is much keener.

One subject lost all taste for tobacco after the third day of fasting.

### Berkeley Co-Eds Go Forth in Trousers, But Land in Jail
