HONOR ROLL AT THE HIGH SCHOOL IS MADE PUBLIC

This year an honor system has been established in Medford high school. Any student taking four subjects or more and receiving grades of "A" (94-100) in three, and not below "B" (83-93) in all others, is considered an honor student. The first honor roll for this year was read this afternoon at an assembly held at 1:10 o'clock.

Miss Grace Currie, a sophomore, taking six subjects and receiving "A's" in all of them, leads the school in scholarship. She is only 15 years old and as her course is a very heavy one she is regarded as an exceptional student. Her courses include French, Latin, geometry, civics, English and outside music.

Philip Lounsbury leads the seniors with four "A's" and one "B." Oliver Taylor is next in line with four "A's." Esther Palmer has to her credit three "A's" and two "B's." Emily Brown, three "A's" and one "B," and Marjorie Goff three "A's" and one "B." In the junior class Dorothy Eads and Juanita Demmer both received four "A's."

In the sophomore class Vivian Coss received four "A's," and in the freshman class Marlan Brown received four "A's" and one "B." There were several students whose grades did not come up to the "A" standard, but who received honorable mention. They were Eugene Shellin, Dorothea Shatz, George Silliman, Rosalie Root, Nina Hoelne, Harold Hartsock, Josephine Waldron, Douglas Wood and Echo McCollum.

Students are exempt from final examination in all subjects in which they receive "A's." In the years preceding there were no exemptions allowed.

HEAVENS ARE NOW FULL OF UNUSUAL STARS, SAYS EXPERT

BERKELEY, Cal., Nov. 6.—(A. P.)—This is the month stars gazers should polish up their telescopes, for the heavens will be full of unusual astral sights.

Professor William F. Meyers, associate professor of astronomy of the University of California, in a statement yesterday told of the stars that will be visible in November.

High in the northeast the bright star Capella, the "she goat," and the constellation known as Capella's kids, will be clearly visible this month, Professor Meyers said. Capella, the fifth in the heavens in the order of brightness, is a yellow star, nearly the same color as the sun.

"Mira, the wonderful," which is approaching its maximum brightness, will be seen in the southern sky, while over in the east, says Professor Meyers, the great star Aldebaran, with its diameter of 39,000,000 miles, will be visible.

Also in the east is the Pleiades group, known as the "seven sisters," although only six are conspicuous. More than 100 self-luminous bodies can be seen in this group, the professor said, and their distance from the earth "is not less than 10,000,000 times that of the sun."

Miss Swanson plays two roles—mother and daughter—and in playing these parts she makes so wide a difference in the women it hardly seems possible the same person is playing them.

She wears many beautiful gowns in both characters, and she is the personification of irresponsible youth as the girl.

Anthony Jovitt is the new leading man. Dorothy Cummings plays the wife and Alec B. Francis is the French husband of the mother.
