Approximately \$271,250 must be raised next year by taxation in Josephine county as outlined by the tentative budget which was adopted at the November meeting of the county court, acting with the budget committee. This sum is \$16,408.85 greater than the levy of last year and will call for a tax levy of about 1.8 mills greater than the 2 3/4 mills of last year.
