### JURY SELECTED IN MURDER CASE STARTING MONDAY

A jury to hear the testimony in the trial of Hyman Huntley, charged with first degree murder as the result of a stabbing affray last September 2, in which Jesse James Gibbs was killed, was secured this morning in the circuit court as follows:

John Mast, Medford; Alfred J. Hensler, Medford; Fred W. Pinkerton, Ashland; D. E. Phipps, Medford; William Barnhart, Central Point; John Cox, Medford; C. W. McDonald, Medford; A. R. Brown, Ashland; J. E. Weaver, Central Point; John Kass-tion, Phoenix; C. H. Merriman, Medford; and M. M. Kendall, Central Point.

The jury was secured sooner than expected. Counsel for each side asked each juror his position on capital punishment. About 35 were examined before 12 men were selected. The jury and court recessed until Monday, when the opening statements and testimony will begin.

A verdict in favor of W. J. Fredenburg for \$200 and costs was returned Friday afternoon in the civil suit of I. E. Schuler against Fredenburg. The action arose over a controversy regarding the excavating of a basement for an apartment house at Sixth and Oakdale streets. Schuler filed suit with an injunction asking for \$500 damages for delay in starting the work. Fredenburg filed a counter suit asking for approximately \$700 damages as a result of annulling his contract.

### STOLEN ARTICLES FOUND IN ROOM, OCCUPANT GONE

Papers left in a dresser drawer last night by a transient roomer in a front street rooming house, giving his name as Robert Hammond of Portland, proved to be papers stolen from the Troubadour Cabinet Works early Thursday morning together with several checks, currency, cash and rings. The papers were found by the proprietor this morning.

Hammond, according to the police, had rented the room for the night, but did not use it for sleeping purposes. It is presumed that he spent a short time there only to sort out his loot, keeping what he thought to be of value and putting the papers in the drawer with several keys he had also stolen.

He is said to be 35 years of age and according to his description is five feet eight inches tall, wore a blue shirt, dirty overalls, soft hat, and an old black overcoat.
