

ASHLAND SCHOOLS ASK FOR \$66,916 FOR COMING YEAR

ASHLAND, Nov. 6. — Ashland school district asks for a sum of \$66,916.50 for the coming year. The tax rate is slightly raised by tax levy. The district called for last year and also on the new bonds. The whole sum required to run the school for the coming year is \$95,256.50. The remainder of the sum will be raised by the county school tax, the state elementary tax, the state school tax, and from tuitions paid by students from outside the district.
