KLAMATH WILD DUCKS FREE FROM DISEASE IS EXPERT DECISION

KLAMATH FALLS, Nov. 6.—Wild ducks in Klamath county are free from disease, according to the findings of United States Deputy Game Warden Daley, District Warden J. Barnes and County Agent Henderson, who made a thorough investigation of the Klamath duck situation. Their report, however, does not pertain to the Northern California or Tule wild fowl situation.

The game officials report that no dead birds were found in Klamath lake and express the belief that the malady which has caused the death of 50,000 or more wild ducks is confined to the waters of Tule lake. In their opinion this would disprove the theory that the disease prevalent in the Tule lake district is cholera. Tule lake is located in the northern part of Modoc and Siskiyou counties and is the only section affected, according to the report.

W. T. Johnson, poultry pathologist, department of veterinarian medicine at Oregon Agricultural college, who is also making an investigation at the lake, in a communication Wednesday said no trace of cholera had been found.

LOCAL WARDEN IS ABSENT FROM LIST OF SALARY RAISES

Medford and other members of the Jackson County Sportsmen's association are wondering why, in the list of salary raises granted by the state game commission recently, the name of Roy Parr, Jackson county game warden, does not appear. The name of Pat Daily, the state ranger warden, does appear as credited to Medford, but in the list as given out for publication a mistake is made in crediting D. T. Godsil, the Lake county game warden, to Medford.

Salary increases amounting to \$3570 a year have been granted officers, deputy wardens and office assistants of the state game commission under a revision made by E. F. Averill, state game warden, and endorsed by a majority of the commission.

Under this revision the salary of the state game warden was increased from \$300 to \$350 a month and 19 other increases were endorsed. Averill said that it had not been necessary to lay off any regular wardens to provide for these increases and that there was an estimated surplus of funds amounting to \$12,368 in the department fund as of November 1.

Other increases and the new monthly salaries are as follows:

Smith, Seaside, \$5; \$160; Henry Stevenson, Salem, \$5; \$140; and George W. Russell, \$30 \$170.

The salaries of 19 other deputy wardens were not affected by the revision.

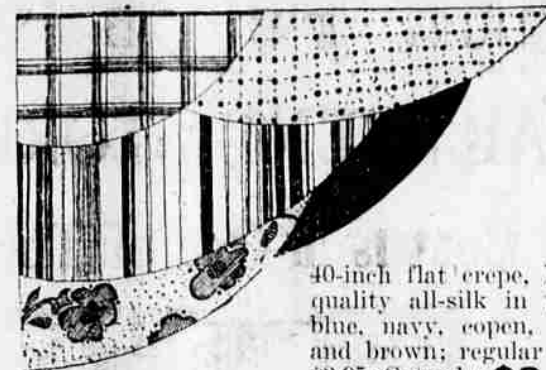
