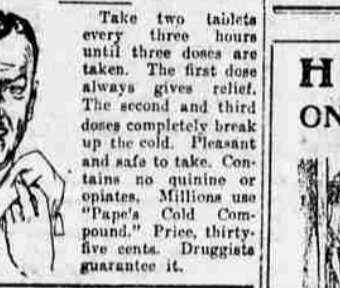
Knoles is a very good scribe and wrote the majority of the checks on a Portland bank, signing the name of Victor Cheney, together with the address of this fictitious personage.
